### St Patrick's Primary School Eco School Committee

St. Patrick's Eco Committee were delighted earlier this year that the school had been awarded its 4th Green Flag. This is a fantastic achievement – involving a lot of hard work from all of the pupils.

Our World', along with the mandatory 'Litter' topic. The children looked at our school's Global Ecologic Footprint. The children were also very interested in Fairtrade, and seeing what action we could take.

Many initiatives were led by the children. The school has an outdoor clothing recycling bank and we collect and recycle ink cartridges and mobile phones. News and requests for help are placed in the Church bulletin, and school website/newsletter. Stalls at Parents' Night have been used to tell the whole community of our Eco-Schools projects. Parents and grandparents help us maintain our school grounds. When taking part in litter picks along the River Carron we involve parents. School open days such as our

Orchard Day and Jubilee celebrations are used to promote Eco-Schools work.
Christine Bell from Communities Along the Carron (CATCA) has been very supportive in St. Patrick's Green Flag journey. She supported the school in creating a plaque for the heritage trail along the River Carron. She worked with last year's P7 helping each of them achieve a John Muir Award.

Christine also helped St.

Patrick's develop links with the wider community when its pupils met with some pupils from Denny High, to take part in a joint litter pick/clean up of the river.

Michelle Miller Allen, who sadly passed away earlier

this year, from Green Dog Walkers had supported us in raising the issue of dog fouling with parents and adults in the community. She was wonderful to work with, and will be missed by everyone in St. Patrick's and by the wider community.

More recently, we have been involved with the Stoneywood Care Services. They have agreed to support the school in developing and maintaining our grounds, to encourage and care for wildlife.

The whole school took part in a 'Play on the Longest Day' event. This involved children spending the entire day outside. The children took part in art activities, storytelling, sports, playground games, den building, obstacle courses, and modelling using recycled materials. This was a huge success, and children appreciated the outdoors and their environment. Children observed nature, considered their own health and wellbeing, and enjoyed the benefits of the work they carried out in relation to the eco action plan. The eco committee are already looking towards their 5th Green Flag. Following completion of the Environmental Review Checklist, the children are interested in focussing on 'Energy' and 'Sustaining

The children looked at our school's Global Ecological Footprint. The children were also very interested in Fairtrade, and seeing what action we could take. The excellent work carried out by the school's Rights Respecting School Steering Group could help us to address this eco topic.

The children also wished to look at addressing some of the points on the Energy Environmental review page. We have discussed applying for grants to improve the school's energy efficiency. We also hope to spread the energy saving message into children's homes by involving parents. We are taking part in a scheme with Home Energy Scotland whereby children

will be given energy monitors, which will allow them to change energy habits at home.

We have also been successful in applying for the Wrigley's Litter Less campaign. We have arranged with CATCA to adopt a stretch of the river Carron. We carry out regular litter picks, monitoring the amount collected, and will check if keeping the area tidy is a deterrent to further littering.

Eco-Schools has benefited our school in many ways. The most obvious is the impact on our grounds. We are lucky enough to have very large grounds. Eco-Schools has encouraged us to use these in a much more eco friendly way. Our beautiful planters, orchard and trees encourage wildlife. They also encourage children to take pride in their school grounds. Eco-Schools helps to foster children's health and wellbeing. Caring for the local environment makes children aware of local green spaces which they can access to be active and healthy. Caring for these spaces ensures that children see the benefits of keeping them litter free, and hopefully this is an attitude which will be carried into their adult lives. The playground of St. Patrick's borders the path running along the River Carron. This is enjoyed by the local community. These people regularly comment on our beautiful school grounds - our orchards, planters, wild grass areas and trees. Our work outside the school gates was recognised by Denny Community Green Initiative, who presented us with a beautiful trophy, in recognition of our contribution to our area. Our eco committee was also nominated by a parent for Falkirk's 'Learning to Achieve' awards. We were shortlisted for this award in recognition of the contribution the eco committee makes to the school and wider community – a contribution St. Patrick's is working hard to maintain and develop.

### A Kenyan Visitor

In August 2013, a representative from Bo'ness Public School and two from Graeme High went to Kenya to visit charity Johari's Miale Social Development and Enterprise Projects.

Both schools have developed a long-term relationship with Johari and have made a very valuable contribution in supporting Miale Projects. Funds were raised to help pay for school fees, buy books, art materials and crops for the farming project. In March 2014, Regina Wambui, Johari's Social Development Manager, visited Scotland through 'The **British Council Connecting** Classrooms' funding - a result of a successful application made by Joanne and Vickie, the Graeme High teachers.

Regina spent time at Graeme High visiting a number of classes. In Modern Studies she gave pupils an insight into life in Kenya and highlighted the challenges.

In PSE, the discussion was on sex education and relationships. Regina commented on the different approach taken in Kenya to covering these subjects. The children supported through Johari's Miale Projects are from a vulnerable background and Regina works closely with the schools in Kibera (urban slum) and Kandara (rural location) to identify the children most in need of support. The Miale Social Development Team work closely



with the schools and guardians ensure the safety and monitor the

progress of the children.

Regina was very interested in hearing from the Guidance Teachers and Pupil and Learning Support team at Graeme High. She was amazed by the level of support provided. This support does not exist in schools in Kenya but the Miale team offer regular monitoring, counselling and peer group discussion to encourage the children academically, develop social skills and raise self-esteem.

The 'Cute as a Button' team; an enterprise project at Graeme High, also met with Regina as they fundraised for the Miale Projects by making and selling jewellery. They have been sharing projects with Johari Designs which makes clothing and jewellery with 100% of the profit being fed back into the Miale Projects.

Regina paid a visit to the Graeme High Bike Academy where she came away with lots of ideas about how to develop a similar set -up which can lead to employment. The Graeme High Bike Academy has offered support to get this venture off the ground



in Kenya.

Regina then went off to visit Bo'ness Public School. She visited classes and talked about life in Kenya. Of particular interest to the children was - weather, housing, roads, transport, animals, clothing, food and crops! P3 had recently shared information with children on the Miale Projects through scrap books on farming and weather. P3 and P4 had also hosted Johari fashion shows with the help of teacher Alan Potters who had visited the Miale projects. Both classes were interested in finding out how their fundraising efforts were supporting the children.

Regina was treated to an enjoyable afternoon of music. A visit to the after school Scottish Country Dance class helped to highlight the opportunities that are available in school for the children. Regina took part in the dance class and will be sharing her new dance skills with the Miale children!





## FoCaL Communication Environment Awards for Carmuirs and Grange Primary Schools

FoCaL, Focus on Communication and Learning, is a joint Falkirk Council Education Services and Speech and Language Therapy approach to supporting children's communication and learning within the mainstream school.

The main aim of the project is to work together on children's speech, language, communication, confidence and learning within the school environment.

Speech and language therapists have been working alongside teaching staff in selected schools to enhance the learning experience for pupils and introduce programmes to support language development. The outcome for the children's language development has been very positive. For example, during the 9 month time frame of the project, the children assessed in the FoCaL schools improved their spoken language skills on average by the equivalent of 12 to 14.5 months.

While the focus of the language intervention work has been on P1 to P3, all staff in each school have been involved in training and in considering how to improve the communication environment within their schools. This benefits all children, particularly those who are visual learners, have attention difficulties,

rely on structure and routine, lack confidence in participation or have spoken language difficulties.

During the course of the academic year the schools involved in FoCaL have the opportunity to work towards achieving a communication environment award - either Bronze, Silver or Gold.

All schools involved in the approach have worked extremely hard in making positive changes to their communication environment. Special credit must however be given to both Carmuirs and Grange Primary Schools, who were recently presented with awards for their achievements last academic session.

School are generally encouraged to aim for the Bronze level award in year one, silver in year two, followed by gold in year three. Carmuirs Primary and Grange Primary have exceeded expectations by achieving bronze and silver awards in a very short time scale and are currently working towards their gold awards. This is an outstanding achievement and all involved should be congratulated.

10 Schools attended the event to receive their certificates presented by Nigel Fletcher, Acting Director of Education.





#### **Oxgang School News**

This session Oxgang School and Support Services have been working in partnership with 24 Primary Schools to support pupils at risk of exclusion due to social, emotional and behavioural needs. We currently support over 50 children within their mainstream schools or based in Oxgang School.

In May we put out a questionnaire on survey monkey and received 26 responses from. The graphs below highlight how Falkirk Schools have rated our work this session. I have included some of our most positive comments throughout this article. The results of this questionnaire will be discussed at our Outreach Development Day on Thursday 26<sup>th</sup> June and will form the basis for our improvement priorities next session.



#### Our vision statement

We want all children to feel positive, safe and happy at school. We want them to have every possible opportunity to experience success within their local school and have friendships in their home community. We hope that each child can recognise their potential as a learner. We want to ensure that children and families have their voices heard in the decisions that affect them.



This session 4 children have returned to mainstream primary schools and will hopefully now be able to move on towards secondary education within their own community and with their friends.

Providing children with good-quality education and care in their earliest years can help them to succeed at school and later in life. This contributes to creating a society where opportunities are equal regardless of background.

As part of our Service commitment to early intervention we support children and their families, nurseries and schools with the transition journey from nursery to Primary 1. We believe that by planning and working together at this crucial stage we can provide children experiencing social, emotional or behaviourial needs with the foundations for a positive, happy and safe mainstream school experience within their own community.

One example of our success in this area is our work, with Denny Day Nursery and Antonine Primary School in Bonnybridge. The initial support began for the child while still in nursery in June 2013. We worked closely with the nursery staff to build a clear picture of the child's needs and then put together a positive behaviour plan to accompany and support the child into P1. The plans and information were shared with the child's carers and school staff and Outreach Support was also agreed for the initial stages of P1.

We worked alongside the Primary 1 teacher to help build positive relationships and effective communication between everyone who has an investment in the child's education. Support continued weekly in a range of ways and by the end of January the school felt confident that strategies for supporting the child were in place and could be continued by the school.

The support which we offer is linked to Falkirk's Framework for Behaviour Management.

We will work with schools at each stage of the framework to achieve the benefits of early intervention. The range of work we can undertake is described on the diagram to the right.

Types of support we offer, linked to staged intervention.

Support from our service is allocated by an authority steering and monitoring group. Requests are made to the group by

the child's primary school.

Priority for

\*Setting up structured friendship groups - and building capacity for school staff to run these groups.

\*Supporting children, families and colleagues to recognise the needs behind behaviour and work with them to find ways to meet these needs.

\*involving children and their families in all planning and decision making.



Elaine Costello (Acting Head of Additional and Individual Support) and Beverley Isdale (o.o.s. care development worker). The staff team took part in professional dialogue about our service; its successes and challenges. Both the leadership team and the service team felt that this was a very beneficial experience and look forward to the actions that can be taken forward as a result of our conversations.

staff, families and children to think about the needs of our small school. There was a unanimous vote that to further improve the health and wellbeing of our children we should aim to create an outside play area for pupils.






#### Rainbow Bridge Activity - PUPIL PARTICIPATION March 2014


