The Falkirk Primary Schools Cross Country League, organised by Falkirk Victoria Harriers, entered its 13th year when the first event of the new season recently took place on a glorious day in Callendar Park.

The league has grown each year from its initial pilot supported by Evelyn Williamson at Carronshore

PS, through New **Opportunities** funding sourced by Gillian Thomson to becoming a standalone event for the last few years. Support is provided by numerous

volunteers, many taking holidays and time off work to assist, along with Frances Miller of St Andrews Ambulance Association and ActiveSchools arranging for sports development pupils from Graeme HS to come along and help too. In most schools teachers, janitors or school helpers organise training and after school clubs to prepare the pupils for the challenging one mile courses which are set out to championship standards.

Over the years the number of participating Schools has steadily increased as word has got out on what a great event this is for pupils' education and self esteem. The first match this year was an extra special occasion as 'Go Run for Fun'

attended for the first time and arranged for the attendance of Eilidh Child, Scotland's current European 400m hurdles Champion and Commonwealth Games Silver medallist. She spoke to and encouraged pupils who had each received a T-shirt to mark the occasion. A record 34 out of 51 of


> the authorities' primary schools were greeted by the BBC's Bryan Burnett who announced each school to loud cheers from the pupils proud be representing their school. All the children

wear given tee-shirts to wear and so the park was a sea of pink! Ineos sponsor this campaign and for Falkirk to be the first in Scotland to sign up to it, it was a real triumph for Caroline, the Harriers and our pupils.

In a new feature of the event. schools were allocated to assembly points in front of Callendar House which allowed them to easily regroup and meet up after races. This

also kept everyone close by the start line where a mass warm up took place.

In front of a large crowd of proud parents and grandparents the P5 girls lined up behind

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their school sign before being called forward to the start line by Bryan. Eilidh gave some final encouragement before starting the race. This was repeated for each of the six races which all followed the same course and included hills as well as part of the Antonine wall before finishing in front of cheering school mates and parents back in front of Callendar House.

however the event is not just about the winners. Every pupil benefits from exercise in the fresh air, learns about team work and gains a sense of achievement for completing the course and



improving their performance which in turn increases their self esteem. Each pupils needs individual application, commitment, discipline and dedication. All part of a great education, this event is all-inclusive encouraging as many pupils as possible to take part.

Our very own, Caroline Lawless from the ASL Team, is instrumental in the success of the league providing all of the admin and the crucial link between Falkirk Victoria Harriers and the schools. It's a massive task as Caroline books the park, liaises with Lynsey Wallace from the Community Trust regarding all of the activity that will take place on the day, advises the various bus companies of access and drop off points as well as parking arrangements, organises all of the volunteers. communicates with the schools advising of arrangements and obtaining names of all the pupils taking part who are then each provided with an individual race number for the season. When the event is over Caroline goes home and enters all of the pupils numbers and times against their finishing position and finalises the results which are then sent to the schools.

Each pupil receives points based upon their finishing position and the first three boys and girls at each of the P5, 6 and 7 stages with the lowest points having completed all three matches receives a trophy at the end of the season. There are also team prizes based upon schools totals. All prizes are presented after the final match in Camelon Education centre with the winning schools receiving a trophy to keep for the year and individuals receiving plaques to keep.

Learning to Achieve Awards 2014

The fifth annual Learning to Achieve Awards ceremony took place on Thursday the 25th September at Falkirk High School who were our hosts for this year's glittering event.

We had so many entries this year that we couldn't invite all nominees. The top three nominations in each category were invited along to hear about the best practice and most dedicated staff in our service and find out if they had won.

Four of the nine awards were sponsored and received a bigger trophy from our sponsors who were there to present them on the night. The winners and shortlisted projects were as follows -

Category - Science and Technology

Winner - Kinnaird Nursery Nativity Performance – Led by Donna Green, Lynette Wilson, Judith Walker, Linda Robertson, Susan Hughes, Caroline Patterson and Alice Davidson.



This project stood out because of the innovative use of IT to enhance something as traditional as the annual nativity play. 100 children were involved in choosing which part they wanted to play, what music and songs they would sing and helping to make the props. The children also used a web camera and movie maker software to record and edit their rehearsals - clips of which were incorporated into the final show in front of a large audience of parents and friends. Some children become quite shy performing in front of a large group - and remember these children are all aged under 5 years - so parents were delighted to see them performing for the camera and using the software confidently when the footage was projected on the big screen in the school hall last December.

P6 worked with their class teacher Carol Fraser and Laura MacDonald and Louise Tierney from Falkirk Community Trust to turn history detectives to research the impact of the First World War on eight former Laurieston Primary Pupils. From 1914 -1918 Mr James Mather, the headmaster at the time, compiled an album of photographs and stories of pupils who served in the war. This rich historical log was the basis of a project which engaged the children enthusiastically in this 100th anniversary year of the start of the war and made it relevant to the children's lives today. A local artist and storyteller worked with the children, an exhibition was created which will go on the road later this year and BBC Alba and STV are making a programme on the Scottish / Serbian links and the Scottish Women's Hospitals - which will feature Laurieston Primary because of the story of a former pupil, Nurse Crowe, which was uncovered during this project. The school is proud to honour ex pupils who served in the war and publicise their stories.

Cluster Award for Joint Project

Winner - SCOTS Course at Forth Valley College – Led by Steve Dougan, Fiona Brown and Ernie Romer – involving all secondary schools.



The SCOTS Course - which stands for Schools / College Opportunities to Succeed Course – is aimed at young people at the start of the senior phase who have not thought about College as an option when they leave school. The young people take part in an 8 week taster session at the Forth Valley College covering a range of subjects whilst still working hard in school to gain SQA accredited units and the Falkirk Employability Award. Of the 120 young people that started the course over 90% have either opted to continue at Forth Valley College part time as part of their Senior Phase or have opted to start a full time course at College. This course has reduced the number of young people not going on to positive destinations as well as giving them opportunities for their long term future. Education Scotland has identified this course as good practice and other local authorities are interested to see if it would work in their area. The whole secondary 'cluster' of schools can take advantage of the innovative course for the benefit of their pupils.

Denny High was the first secondary school in Scotland to deliver an HNC Dance Artist qualification. Pupils used Dance for independent work experience in all feeder primary schools as well as leading dance clubs in S1 to S4 in Denny High. Parents have spoken of the positive impact that this whole learning experience has had on pupils. Parents supported the programme by fundraising to increase the opportunities on offer. Pupils were able to visit New York and take dance classes on Broadway as well as working with the world's best choreographers from a Broadway musical. The school has also achieved national recognition for this programme in TESS. Pupils



have now gone on to higher education - some of them have been accepted into dance colleges in London – some straight into year two. The pupils have left behind a legacy with this programme so other pupils in feeder primaries can benefit from this in years to come.

Going for Glasgow at Nethermains Primary

The Going for Glasgow project, set by Active schools, was an excellent opportunity for us at Nethermains to develop some of the work we had begun during the Going for Gold, Olympic Games project.

Staff and pupils embraced the challenges set within the project. This focussed our pupils in developing an understanding of some of the Commonwealth Countries around the world as well as experiencing over 20 sports. We planned a whole school project based around the Commonwealth Games. This involved the development of Global Citizenship across all stages in the school, inspiring and engaging pupils with different sports, making links and visiting sports clubs, working jointly with local

cluster schools and working closely with the high school and the Active Schools team. engaging with future stars/role models. Our main aim was to provide children with learning experiences

which would enhance and extend learning, as well as inspiring and encouraging them to make healthy choices, while developing a positive mental attitude.

As part of the theme links were made to Literacy and Numeracy where pupils developed their talking and listening skills through group work and reading skills in research. Pupils wrote reports and created presentations to share with their peers and parents in our open afternoon. In maths, handling data skills were developed through the investigation and comparison of weather in different countries. At first level the children worked together to create their own expressive dance for our opening ceremony and to welcome the baton at our cluster baton relava-

Links were made with many local clubs within our community, such as: Falkirk School of Gymnastics, Stenhousemuir Football club, Falkirk Tennis Club, our local basketball team and Active Schools coordinators. We planned lunchtime clubs in conjunction with active schools - badminton, table tennis, basketball and tennis. Several of our newly formed teams took part in festivals.

Each of our teachers planned an eight week block of after school clubs for the summer term which

allowed our children to experience a range of different sports. Over 140 children took part these clubs, including: rugby, gymnastics, cricket, cycling, netball, kickboxing, athletics/cross country, commonwealth team games and

iunior journalists. Our junior journalists took a lead role in recording, taking photos and reporting on our project. They displayed information in school and created a newsletter to share with everyone.

Pupils also had the opportunity to experience sports that they had never tried before, such as sailing, water polo and synchronised swimming. This allowed pupils to develop many new skills.

Throughout the project our Pupils were engaged

with learning and were inspired to take part in our clubs. with over 80% of our children taking part. One of our P6 pupils,

Mrs Fawkes our DHT shared her enthusiasm and passion for the games by organising many of the events and experiences for our pupils. She also took part as a cast member in the opening and closing ceremony, which sounded very exciting and really captured the interest of us all.

We now look onwards towards building on this fantastic project and our staff and pupils are busy working on our Legacy plan, where we will try to hold onto the enthusiasm the Games has created for sports as well as continuing to build on our link with a school in Australia.

Dunipace Primary Outdoor Learning News

The brief of the Outdoor Learning group was firstly, to undertake an audit of the school grounds and secondly, to access training opportunities and produce initial guidance for staff in the areas of outdoor numeracy and literacy.

An audit of the school grounds was undertaken by members of the staff group. Feedback from pupils was also gathered from class questionnaires (Pupil Council) and also from an audit carried out by the Eco Crew. Parental views were also sought through the Parent Council.

The results showed mutual thinking amongst pupils, parents and staff: more seating in outdoor spaces, a covered area to provide shelter when working/playing outdoors, bat and bird boxes, bird feeders and baths, attractive signs and litter bins of appropriate heights in each playground.

In addition, pupils felt the outdoor space could be made more interesting by having boulders/rocks and tree trunks on which to sit, climb and jump from. Large play equipment featured greatly in their responses such as a school trim trail. Staff on the other hand, liked the idea of a greenhouse and weather station as well as having benches for outdoor class work and lunches. This feedback will inform future projects in our school grounds.

The group made good progress in terms of providing staff with initial guidance by adopting numeracy and literacy guidelines already in use in a number of schools. We hope to add to these guidelines and in the future, make them more specific to our own school, grounds and surrounding area.

A staff session led by Jane Jackson (Outdoor Education Support Teacher) inspired everyone and focused our thinking on what could be achieved by taking learning outdoors. Jane also provided information about internet resources such as Nature Detectives which would support outdoor learning and teaching across the school.

Teacher- "It's reassuring to have guidance notes as a starting point. They give ideas and help you to feel confident that what you already do is valid."

Teacher- "Curricular links to outdoor learning are more evident after taking part in the outdoor training session."

Classes have been busy learning outdoors through a variety of fun contexts and activities:

The Nursery carried out a traffic survey using our clipboards and pencils. We looked for 4 different forms of transport. We had to watch the road carefully so we did not miss any vehicles driving by.

We also helped Captain Bristles to mend his ship by gathering Y-shaped branches and branches shorter than / longer than a given length.

P1 took a walk around Dunipace and learned lots of interesting facts including the Dunipace shield and about the artwork in the old railway tunnel which was by the same artist who painted our Nursery mural.

As part of 'The Street' topic, Primary 2 have been learning about Road Safety and safe ways to cross the road. We even had a practice outside! Finally P2 made a Road Safety guide by ordering instructions for crossing the road and drawing road signs. Primary 2 also braved the cold weather and went for a walk around the village to try and find different features of the streets. Each of us had a clip board and pencil to tick everything we could find on our 'Street' check list.

Primary 5 have been taking spelling practise outdoors and playing team games to improve our knowledge of phonemes and spelling patterns.

"We like working outdoors as you are more active and moving around. It's a fun way to do spelling and you don't have to sit at your desk!" Jonathan and Martin

"Being outdoors makes you feel good and it's fun to do things like spelling in the fresh air instead of sitting in the classroom." Lauren and Melissa

Primary 6 planted fruit bushes in the school garden.

"It's amazing to see the fruit bushes grow and to think about the lovely fruit we'll be able to eat. We planted a tayberry bush which nobody had heard of before! It's a cross between a raspberry and a blackberry." Jake

"We had to be very careful removing the pots from the fruit bushes so as not to damage the roots. We also had to dig deep holes to allow the roots to spread." Aaron

Fiona, the wildlife ranger came to help the Eco Crew add some wildlife- friendly touches to the school grounds. She was so impressed with the enthusiasm of the pupils in the group.

Get on Yer Bike!

Pupils at Bonnybridge Primary have been getting on their bikes. The school Eco-group had identified transport as a focus. To encourage people to take to 2 wheels rather than 4, the school launched an ambitious cycling programme. Led by Principal Teacher, Sarah Ritchie, the project involved the delivery of the Bikeability programme across P5 to P7, mini cycling clubs being set up for junior pupils, mountain biking being introduced at Golden Time and cycle fun sessions being introduced to the nursery.

The school received a grant from cycling Scotland to purchase a set of bikes to allow all pupils to participate. All pupils in P5 upwards have now achieved Bikeability Level 1 and the school has embedded the programme into its PE curriculum next session. Pupils are now cycling to school which improves their health and fitness levels. They have also achieved an award from a recognised body. More bikes around the school means less cars which improves the immediate environment by reducing pollution and the global environment by reducing the school's carbon footprint. Pupils are now equipped with a life skill essential for sustainable living.

Clyde, the Commonwealth and Beyond......

Miss Stanners and P6S wanted to explore the Commonwealth in the year that the games came to Glasgow. The class set themselves a challenge of sending Clyde, the Commonwealth mascot, to as



many countries as possible in the year 2014. To date Clyde has been as far afield as Australia and Africa. P6 pupils shared Clyde's adventures on a special blog

embedded on the school website. The blog linked with a whole school approach to learning about the Commonwealth Games. Partnership working was facilitated between pupils. Any pupil in the school could request to take Clyde and could work alongside P6 pupils to tell his story. The blog gave pupils the opportunity to develop skills in digital leadership. These skills were embedded into the curriculum in a very natural way. The blog was

hugely popular and pupils responsible experienced success through a real project. Pupils were highly motivated to promote their blog; by encouraging people to take Clyde and to upload pictures and share his story. Pupils also learned to use social media safely through a real project.



BBC comes to Bonnybridge

Class teacher Michelle Cairns was keen to improve pupils' skills in critical literacy using a real and relevant context. She joined BBC World Class and registered her class to take part in the debates. Every two weeks the class join pupils from across the Commonwealth to debate issues affecting children. The BBC was so impressed by the contributions being made by the children they came to film them in action. Using a Commonwealth themed resource added purpose as the games have arrived in Scotland whilst blogging gives pupils a real context in which to develop critical thinking. The project attracted positive feedback from the BBC when they came to film P6/7 in action. The film was featured on the Scottish News. The project also attracted positive feedback from Education Scotland who featured the video clip and interview with Michelle on the Education for Global Citizenship section of their website.

Commonwealth Class Teams Project

Diane Russell, class teacher, and P7 pupils at Bonnybridge Primary School joined a Commonwealth Class Team project focussing on the Commonwealth games. The project was organised by the British Council and the school was placed in team with 7 other schools from across the Commonwealth to compete against each other in a series of challenges. Over 6 months the children

completed 6 challenges collaboratively and uploaded them to an online space. The project directly improved Education for Global Citizenship within the curriculum by embedding projects. It also gave pupils opportunity to work in partnership with children from across the Commonwealth and learn
