Larbert HS Supports the White Ribbon Campaign

For the second year running Larbert High has supported the White Ribbon 16 days of Action campaign.

This global campaign asks people to sign a pledge never to commit, condone or remain silent about violence against women. Although the campaign focuses on female victims (81% of incidents) it recognises that men can also be victims. 3500 incidents of domestic violence were recorded in the Forth Valley area from 2012-2013 and with Police now recording domestic abuse every 9 minutes in Scotland it is a topic worth discussing with young people. By raising their awareness and giving them the support to deal with issues at home or in their own relationships, Larbert High hopes to give the pupils the courage to speak out about domestic violence.



Larbert High pupils have been working hard during the campaign, creating huge white ribbons to display on the school building and using their time to raise awareness with pupils and staff around the school. Ms McMichan and PC Imrie have been speaking to pupils in school to promote

healthy relationships and provide pupils with the information they need to seek support with this issue

On the 29th of November the pupils took the campaign to the streets of Stenhousemuir to raise awareness with members of the public. Asda provided the pupils with an excellent opportunity to use the store entrance to speak to shoppers and gain their support and the pupils showed enthusiasm for the campaign, taking time to explain to members of the public the important message behind it. £75 was raised through sales of white ribbons and over 140 pledge cards were signed by the public to show support for the campaign.

Stacey McMichan said "Domestic violence is a huge problem in society. We hope that by raising awareness of this we can highlight to young people the importance of acceptable behaviour in a relationship. By exploring this topic, the pupils will be better equipped as adults to recognise relationships which are not healthy and to speak out against abuse. I am aware that this topic may be sensitive for some pupils, and throughout the campaign we have encouraged pupils to speak to guidance staff or PC Imrie if they need any advice or support with any issues raised"

Larbert High School raised £162.50 during the 2014 campaign and added 326 new pledges to their total. An excellent achievement by the pupils for the White Ribbon Campaign.

Feedback from the programme has been excellent with pupils adding that it has been one of the best experiences they have had to date and fuelled their determination to find suitable employment or training opportunities within the company.

The S1 Reading Group (Integrated Pupil Support Faculty) visited the Archive library at Callendar House on the 09/012/14. This is an annual visit which allows the work the group have studied to progress to a deeper level. As part of the reading programme DHT Mr Kevin O'Conner delivered a power point to the group on the Great War. The librarians at the Callendar House deliver a presentation to the group concerning a local man called Private Paxton who as a young man of seventeen enlists at Stirling Castle with the Argyll and Southern Highlanders. The group follow his life as a young soldier who goes off to France to fight for King and Country in 1914. The librarians have original copies of photographs and letters home to his parents in Queen Street Falkirk. Then the terrible news from the front that he had been shot and wounded just days after his nineteenth birthday. This type of experience for the young S1 pupils was a fantastic experience bringing the WW1 to life in a realistic tragic way for a generation of people who have no memory or reality of this terrible event.

The staff of the House were very complimentary of the S1 LHS pupils and the sensible questions they asked during their time in the house. LHS teachers: Mrs Sharkey Reading Coordinator, Mr Wilson English Teacher and Mrs McElroy Librarian were very proud of the young pupils in the Reading Group and the mature and respectful approach they displayed during their time in the house, library and the museum.




Learning Resource Service OPEN WEEK was a huge success with 199 visitors from all sectors attending the event. This was a great way to show



Top 5 Tips for **Spotting Stress**

- You are finding it more difficult to find solutions to problems.
- You are tired and do not feel like you are getting the benefits from your sleep.
- You don't feel as in control of your emotions.
- Time management has become more challenging.
- It is harder to concentrate.

Mindfulness- The research base for the benefits of practising mindfulness is growing, (http://bit.ly/1yRYKyD) One simple way to experience mindfulness in the course of your day is to become aware of yourself while you are eating. Simply concentrating on what you are eating and doing just that during a meal a day. Notice when you start thinking about something else entirely other than your food. When you've become aware bring yourself back to the textures, flavours and smell of your meal. You may need to do this a few times to develop a mindfulness muscle.
