Scottish Finals of The Coca-Cola Challenge

8 talented S3 pupils from S3 Business Education have been selected to attend the Scottish Finals of the Coca-Cola Challenge. In order to secure their place in the finals they had to develop and create a brand image for a new healthy juice drink that had ethics at its heart and corporate social responsibility central to its philosophy. The product had to be original, with an original brand name, logo and slogan, as well as be profitable and commercially viable. They also had to make a link into 'Keep Scotland Beautiful'.



The brand 'Fruit Friends' was created and fought off stiff competition from over 850 schools participating in the challenge to make it to the finals. Their unique selling point was that each flavour had its own alliteratively named 3 dimensional character on the lid, which could be collected or swapped with friends. Their target market was young children aged 5 upwards as they felt this was a gap in the market for Coca-Cola. They also suggested possible further merchandise which could be developed such as books and cuddly toys. They suggested donating 4% of profits to 'Keep Scotland Beautiful' and also tied in a social media campaign encouraging consumers to be photographed with

their products at favourite Scottish locations using the hashtag #fruitfriendsscotland.

Pupils from Grangemouth and Larbert High Schools will be heading out to spend the day at the RSPB's Skinflats Nature Reserve, near Grangemouth, in the company of artist Darren Woodhead (www.darrenwoodheadartist.co.uk) and poet Chris Powici (www.scottishbooktrust.com/profile-author/60637). After a session learning some basic techniques and exploring ideas with the professionals (which will be taking place in a large yurt heated by a woodburning stove to make sure everyone stays warm and inspired) they will go out onto the reserve, which borders the banks of the river, to paint and write about their experiences of this very special place on their doorstep.

Darren Woodhead is a well-known artist who is presently IFLI's Artist-in-Residence. Chris Powici is a widely published poet whose work focuses on human and natural environments and how the 'natural' and 'human' worlds overlap one another.

World Wetlands Day is celebrated every year on 2 February all around the world to raise awareness about the value of wetlands for humanity and the planet. Young people are a key focus – they are the decision-makers of the future. The most important wetlands are designated as Ramsar sites (http://www.ramsar.org/), which means they are of global importance for their wildlife. The Forth Estuary is one of these sites.

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Additional Support Centre Mathematics Class - The Soap Project

In December, the pupils of the S2/3 ASC maths class wanted to raise money for Children in Need. We did this by designing a product and two types of packaging to sell at our Christmas Fayre. This topic

area helped us to forge a link with Carrongrange School as they completed a similar project. This topic covered a range of subjects, as well as maths. We built on our



existing knowledge and developed new skills in Science,

Maths, Art and Design, Health and Well-being and Literacy.

The pupils discussed the product that they would like to make and decided on soap. We explored a range of Christmas shapes that we could use as moulds and the smells and colours that are pertinent at Christmas time. The pupils followed visual instructions to help them make their product.

At the same time, the pupils investigated suitable forms of packaging and design and created lovely Christmas boxes and bags suitable for holding big and small soaps.

The pupils held a very successful sale at morning interval and were sold out! A total of £21.00 was raised for Children in Need.

Outdoor Learning

Grangemouth High pupils in S1 and S2 have been



out and about exploring their local area. They have worked hard to develop teamwork and social communication skills that help

them to support each other through personal and physical challenges. Their enthusiasm for being out in all weathers is amazing. Over



the remaining academic year, pupils will continue have opportunities to plan, review and engage in a variety of activities, culminating in planning for a residential experience.

Humanities Faculty

15 Grangemouth High pupils have been trained as Mentors in Violence Prevention (MVPs), and will be working with the S1 pupils in the Humanities faculty.



The mentors are all S5 pupils who volunteered to be part of this programme.

They have so far taken part in Child Protection

training in school with Dr Holland, as well as a full day of training at Tulliallan Police College with Ms McQuillan, PC Whelan and Dr Holland. The MVP programme will run as part of the Humanities curriculum and Grangemouth High is one of two schools that have been selected to pilot this programme. We will be working closely with Police Scotland Violence Reduction Unit. The aim is to educate our young people in how to reduce crime on all levels within their society and school environment.

Extra-Curricular Experiences

Expressive Arts

The Drama club are working on "Sparkleshark" with a view to putting on a performance; this project provides the senior Drama pupils with leadership experience as they are responsible for the entire production.

School Show - This year's production is *The Addams Family* and pupils are hard at work in

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rehearsals for the performances which take place in June.

Our Advanced Higher Art and Design pupils were invited (along with pupils from Braes High School and Bo'ness Academy) to the Scottish Parliament recently to attend an exhibition of works by Anne Powers who has painted all of the First Ministers of Scotland. The pupils had been asked to put together some examples of the portrait work, and a book was on display there comprising of work from

Performances

As always, our Expressive Arts Faculty have been working hard to produce a variety of high quality events across our cluster and in the local community. These include: Our Aunnual Music Competition (October 2015) with vocal and instrumentalist winners both junior and senior; the Falkirk Council Remembrance Assembly at Falkirk Town Hall (senior vocal group and Joe and Jamie performed); Christmas Cluster Concerts involving pupils from all cluster primaries and GHS – music and drama were involved in performances and the Art department designed the set/backdrop. Our Grangemouth High Samba Academy also recently gave a performance at Grangemouth Town Hall.



Physical Education Leadership Programme

We now have a team of leaders from S1-S6 (also delivering a Young Leaders programme in Primary Schools through the Active Schools Programme) and former pupils returning from Forth Valley College to help deliver our Active Schools programme at Grangemouth High and the local Primaries. They are also working with Sports Development and at Community clubs on a regular basis. This year we are looking to make links with local clubs to improve pathways for player/performer development and also to develop our leaders skills as coaches and event organisers.

Through our leaderships programme we have now established a Sports Council, Dance Steering Group and are in the process of re-establishing the Promotions team. All of these groups are led by our senior leaders team and allow learners in Grangemouth High and local Primaries to voice their opinions as to the direction we take Sports and Physical Activity in the local area, through consultation with staff. These groups have already started to make changes to our Active Schools programme. Grangemouth High has achieved a Silver Sportscotland School Sport Award through the Sports Council.

We currently have 6 Young Ambassadors who have received training through the Youth Sport Trust and Sportscotland, a team of experienced Senior Leaders, and we have now recruited some new Senior and Junior volunteers to join our team. They have mentors within the PE Department, GHS staff, Active Schools, Sports Development or Sportscotland who support them in planning sessions and providing feedback to develop their skills. We are now introducing the role of Competition and Events Organiser into S2/S3 where two successful learners will receive training from the Youth Sport Trust in March. Several learners have applied for the post and we will be holding interviews later this month. The successful candidates will work with Miss Dundas and the Young Ambassadors team to take this role forward.

Cluster Basketball

We have made links with Glasgow Rocks through the Jump2lt programme, Falkirk Fury Basketball Club, Grangemouth Ladies Basketball Club, Basketballscotland, Active Schools and Sports

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Development. This has helped us to create a basketball programme across the Falkirk Area with Grangemouth being a Hub school.

We now have Basketball clubs running in all Grangemouth cluster Primary schools with Leaders and Parents coaching clubs. We also hold a Grangemouth Hub club on a Monday night for all Grangemouth cluster pupils to attend.

We have 12 leaders who have now completed Level



1 Refereeing Course, Level 1 Table Official Course and Positive Coaching Scotland Training. The leaders have a mentor from Basketballscotland who works with them providing feedback and support.

We have 7 Primary Schools attending our conference event monthly with the leaders refereeing, coaching and table officiating. The leaders will also be running the Regional Development League and have gained paid work through their qualification.

Trinity Sailing Expedition

A group of students were given the exciting opportunity to participate in a sailing expedition around the West of Scotland. This adventure helped

develop skills and values that will be useful throughout their lives and will impact on their life experiences, their home life and the people they encounter along the way.



This once in a lifetime opportunity was only possible with the support of Trinity Sailing, the charity who organise the expedition, through a bursary and

financial contributions from the school Parent Council and Glasgow Freight Club.

Scottish Folklore Storytelling

At Bothkennar, we felt privileged to be invited along to The Kelpies on Thursday 26th November to take part in a Scottish Folklore storytelling workshop.



On the morning of the workshop, P5- P7 walked to the Helix Park while P1-P4 were transported by bus. Upon arrival, we were welcomed inside the impressive sculptures where we were introduced to Vikki from library services, Jan, an illustrator and Alison, a folklore storyteller.



Allison had us all engrossed from the start. She told us the tale of 'The Kelpies Pearls.' After the story, we had the opportunity to take part in some activities including creating kelpies of our own. We did this in groups by creating still images. This taught us that kelpies can take many forms and was a lot of fun.



After the workshop, we were taken for hot chocolate and cakes! These went down a treat!

Everyone was really enthusiastic about the visit to The Kelpies and storytelling so the teachers decided to adapt their planning to take advantage of the further learning opportunities.

In P1-P3, we read more stories about kelpies and explored the story of 'The Kelpie of Loch Fada', then we wrote stories about a day when we met a kelpie. We used lots of adjectives to describe our kelpie and thought carefully about what we might see, hear, touch, feel and

smell. Our stories were great, though we're not too sure we'd really want to meet a kelpie!

P4-P7 examined some different kelpie folklore tales. Soon we had a good understanding of the purpose, layout, structure and important features. We have been using film to develop our writing skills so we decided to write a narrative for 'The Loch Ness Kelpie' short animation film. P4-P7 have been learning to use a variety of techniques to improve their writing so we co-operatively planned how we might incorporate these into our stories. We then used our planning to write a shared starter of the story before completing our individual interpretations. It was essential to grab the reader's attention from the beginning with a hook. Once completed and self-assessed, we re-drafted using ICT, including techniques such as graphics to further interest the reader. In true Christmas style, we created glittering kelpie pictures to be displayed alongside our stories.

Jan was very keen to come to Bothkennar to find out what inspiration our visit to The Kelpies had given us. A selection of children read their stories to Jan and showed her our artwork. She was very impressed, thus has asked for a selection to be sent to library services to be displayed.

We'd like to thank Vikki, Jan and Alison very much for organising and providing this inspiring workshop for us. If anyone else has the opportunity, we would highly recommend it!


