All the House Captains and Vice Captains led the Poppy Scotland Appeal. All Sixth Year pupils were given the task of launching the appeal and planning and delivering an assembly for pupils. All Houses selected materials from the Poppy Scotland Website and planned their house assemblies. Pupils then went round different form classes to further promote the Poppy Scotland Appeal.

Food Parcels

In the run up to Christmas staff and pupils began to collect food and Christmas goodies for the Elderly and vulnerable of the Falkirk area. The goods are parcelled up and given out to those in need by members of the Saint Vincent de Paul Society who come into every Christmas for our of term carol concert.

Mrs Norrie's Faith in Action and ASDAN classes led the way in the collecting food. The pupils involved in these classes wrote to different local businesses seeking support. They were delighted with the

support they received from a number of local businesses. Pupils form Ninian House collected charity money every morning during Advent to donate to the food parcels appeal. The money raised by Ninian house was doubled by Mr Phee due to the excellent fund raising efforts of the pupils. Therefore, on the last day



of term St Mungo's donated 75 food parcels to SVP. Thanks to all pupils and parents that helped with the fundraising and donating food.

Engineering Challenging Day

The Enterprise Day for Second Year had an Engineering theme with a Engineering Technology challenge day. The Jiant Jaffa Cake Company Ltd set up its factory in the food technology department and Mrs Dall helped pupils in setting up their factory and how to complete quality control. The company managed to produce over 80 Jiant Jaffa Cakes and they all passed quality control. The chocolate consistency was just right and really yummy.

The Design Technology department got in on the act by designing crash helmets for eggs. Mr McGee and Mr Muir reached new heights with S2 classes as they dropped many different 'styled' crash helmets. Some eggs even survived the drop and were recycled. Also, in the design technology department pupils set about designing a pulley system that would stop farmers in Peru from ending up with squashed tomatoes. Thankfully no tomatoes were harmed in the exercise and all S2 pupils managed to successfully design a working system in which the tomatoes were picked and safely transported down the mountain.

The institute of civil engineers came into school to lend their support to pupils. They helped pupils discover the real life applications of civil engineering and launched the schools entry into the WestPoint bridge competition. We have a number of budding civil engineers who very quickly grasped the principle of designing the best structure at the smallest possible cost, so watch out for them in the future with the new forth crossing.

Second Year pupils also got the opportunity to use the computer software SCRATCH. This allowed them to see the variation of the different applications of computing as a subject. All pupils involved in Engineering Challenge Day were awarded a CREST in a Day Award. These will be awarded to pupils at an assembly before the end of the school year.


Work Experience

FourthYear pupils will be going on work experience in June. This year pupils will be going out to a range of interesting placements including the BBC, BAA at Edinburgh Airport, 3D Reid Architects in Edinburgh and many of our local primary schools. Pupils involved in the work experience program appreciate the opportunities given to them in the current economic climate and realise the continued importance in this area of the curriculum.

Stone Carving

As part of our school links with 'My Future's In Falkirk' Gardner Molloy came into St Mungo's HS for two days in March. He is doing the restoration work on the Old Parish church on Falkirk High Street. Gardner came into school and explained the project to groups of pupils from S1 to S6.

Pupils were then given instruction and appropriate safety equipment before being given the chance to take part in shaping a small part of the future of Falkirk. The two stones



which were carved by the pupils will be inserted into the church before it is completed.

Gardner also brought along examples of his work and spent a long time answering different questions from pupils. All pupils that took part in the activity were surprised at how much concentration they had to apply and how slowly the process went. Gardner was delighted with the quality of work produced by pupils. Mr Phee and some of the Design Technology staff also had a go at carving.

REDESIGN

A group of 5th and 6th year pupils who are completing the Higher Product Design Course took part in a REDESIGN workshop in the Glasgow Science Centre hosted by the Ellen McArthur Foundation. The focus of the workshop was to look at how to reduce and improve the sustainability of the UK and how these pupils as the future of our country are going to address this topic. The pupils were all given a certificate which Mr Phee awarded to them when they returned to school.

Inter-disciplinary Project

Part of the Faculty of Technology inter-disciplinary unit in S2 this year has seen pupils design and



making their own spicy noodle snacks. Pupils were given the task of designing the packaging, developing the recipe and advertising campaign for their spicy noodle product.

Pupils worked in groups to collaborate on different campaigns and flavours.


Pupils then involved the rest of the class by delivering a range of advertising campaigns – some focussed on nutritional information and pricing strategies. Other groups found sponsorship.

Gale Force

The Gale Force Project gave all S2 pupils the opportunity to learn more about renewable energy. There was a particular focus on wind energy.

Terry Hog from Scottish Enterprise Renewable

energy division came into school to launch the project and explained to pupils how the focus on energy development in Scotland was moving away from Fossil Fuels towards renewable sources of energy.



Science Centre Trip

Pupils took part in a trip to the science centre which allowed them to test out

different designs for their wind turbines. When pupils got back to St Mungo's they manufactured their own mini windmill/turbine. Pupils also looked at the energy calculations that they needed to carry out to design a successful wind turbine.


All pupils won a GREEN CREST AWARD for this project and these will be presented at a school assembly later in the term. The project that S2 pupils were involved in has also made the short list of CREST Green awards which will be judged in June at the Glasgow Science Centre.

Annual Fun Run

Our annual school fun run was held in September this year. All staff and pupils were given the opportunity to dress to impress for the occasion. Moses came with his tablet of commandments (aka Mr Phee) and led staff and pupils on their journey.

All pupils were also dressed for the occasion and a huge variety of outfits and ideas were on show.

Some pupils worked in teams and came in a variety of different costumes. Thousands of pounds were raised for the Pupil Council.



Highland Spring Water very kindly donated bottled water for the event and the school provided funds for design and layout of the pupil planner and the name the pupils to enjoy a BBQ at the end. The BBQ was run by the faculty of technology staff.

GLOW the Titanic!!

This year a group of St Mungo's HS pupils found themselves studying the same topic as some primary 4 pupils from St Andrew's. The topic? The sinking of the Titanic. By sheer co-incidence one of the pupils, Dominic Pollock, is the son of Mrs Pollock who is a teacher for the St Mungo's class studying the topic. One further co-incidence - Mrs Pollock's grandfather worked on the Titanic prior to completion in Harland and Wolff's in 1912.

A joint project evolved including a conference and visit. Information was shared and interviews conducted via Glow. Staff and pupils were impressed by how well this worked, and all teachers especially, learned a lot about Glow and its potential. Through it, St Mungo's pupils were able to share research information which we hope the P4's benefited from. Picture quality was good and sound quality, not too bad. ICT support was excellent and we would certainly encourage others to try this if they have not already done so.

On our visit to St Andrew's we could not fail to be impressed by how Miss Sloan, the P4 teacher, had reproduced the Titanic in her own class room - right down to the port holes. Really all that was missing was water pouring in! We were also able to look at some excellent work that the P4s had done and they were able to share much of what they had learned with the senior pupils. It is no cliché to say that it improved both sets of pupils learning and enhanced the learning process, with pupils enjoying the experience of using their knowledge for a clear purpose and in relevant circumstances.

Stations of the Cross

Father Simon, a group of pupils and staff from the Art Department undertook a project this session to design stations of the cross for the school oratory. The stations are based on photos and the colours chosen to fit in with the stained glass window which was also designed by pupils. Each station is printed onto canvas and will be hung in the Oratory.

Pupil Council

Pupils have been active in the school this year and have helped make major decisions. Each House has a Pupil Council and there is a School Pupil Council, with members drawn from the six Houses.

This session the voice of the pupils has been heard loud and clear. Some of the decisions taken by the Pupil Council include changing the school uniform

policy, which charity each House should support, the of school library and the conference room.

The Pupil Council controls a budget of £10,000 and

decided to make a number of purchases. These included outside picnic benches, bins and a flatscreen TV.





Council has advised the Headteacher on what pupils think should be in the new School Improvement Plan.

Charity begins at school.

Staff and pupils have reached deep into their pockets to support those in need. Over £25,000 has been raised, a fantastic amount. Those to benefit from this money include SCIAF, Mary's Meals, CHAS and the homeless. Our first appeal was for the victims of the Pakistan earthquake and over £1,000 was raised.

A large number of events were held during the session to help raise money. During Lent pupils had the opportunity to buy a brick to build a "wonder wall" to support SCIAF. In one day alone during Lent £2,000 was raised.

As well as raising money, pupils also collected food parcels. Staff and pupils were able to bring in tins, packets and bottles. Over seventy parcels were made up - a new record for the school. The parcels were collected for distribution in the community.

Papal Visit 2010

Pope Benedict XVI visited Scotland in September 2010 and celebrated mass at Bellahouston Park, Glasgow. Over 120 senior pupils from St Mungo's travelled to Glasgow for the Mass.

The Mass was a very moving experience and is something that pupils will never forget. The message to our pupils was



clear, "look into your heart, think of all the love that your heart was made to receive, and also love it is meant to give, after all we were made for love".

Some of the staff who attended were at the first papal mass in 1982.

Duke of Edinburgh

There have been many events and trips involving "dukey" staff and pupils this session. The new Bronze Group, which consists of 21 S3 pupils, has just come back from a successful training weekend

in Crianlarich.

Plans are well in place for what will be the busiest June ever. The Silver Group of 20 S4 pupils will be out training in the Lammermuirs followed by their



three day assessment weekend around Killin.

The Gold Group of 23 S6 pupils head to Glencoe for their final assessment, where they meet the "devil" on a climb on the famous Devils Staircase.

July will also be a busy time with 18 of the Gold Group who head to Lourdes with the Youth for Lourdes Group. It has been a busy year planning, organising and fund raising for this special event.

Staff too, deserve a special mention with two members of staff completing WGL Training and another two completing WGL Assessment. Let's call it "staffing for excellence".

In July four pupils will be presented with the Gold award by HRH Prince Philip at Holyrood House.

A Question of Sport

St Mungo's has had a busy year with sport. Many pupils have had the opportunity to get involved in clubs and competitions. These clubs include badminton, basketball, table tennis, hockey, rugby, mountain biking, swimming, boy's football and girl's football. New clubs include rugby and hockey.


Girls have taken a keen interest in the walking/ jogging club. We have encouraged this club to tackle the Fit for Girls Action Plan and also to develop a healthier outlook with the addition of raising funds for a worthwhile charity, Cancer Research. Pupils will take part in the Race for Life...

So far there have been 3 inter-house events held. After these events, Ninian House were in top spot with 180 points. Columba and Andrew came next with 160 and 150 points respectively. It is all still to play for though in the up-and-coming National Sports Week which will be held between the 6th and 10th June. Certificates (designed and created by senior pupils) are given to the pupils who participated in each of the inter-house events.

Active Schools Competitions

The first competition of the year was for swimming.

This was held at Grangemouth on Friday 22nd October and we had around 20 pupils participating. Our pupils won 3 golds, 1 silver and 5 bronze medals.



The Falkirk Cross Country Championships took place in February at Bo'ness. St Mungo's did very

well with plenty of individual medals (1 gold, 1 silver, 1 bronze) and were the overall S1-S2 winners for boys and girls. Our S3/S4 boys were also the overall winners. A great achievement! 17 of these pupils made it through to the Forth Valley Finals held at West End Park, Alloa.

Our pupils entered the Falkirk Secondary Schools Badminton Championships.

This year saw the first water polo competition with a number of schools represented. It was held at St Mungo's with our pupils coming 2nd overall.

During April a number of pupils participated in the Forth Valley Schools Golf Championships. Andrew Wood won a bronze individual medal and Andrew and Ben Craggs won bronze for the team. The boys made it to the Scottish Championships where they will be representing Falkirk District on Monday 6th June.

We recently had 23 pupils participate in the Falkirk Secondary Schools Athletics Championships at Grangemouth Stadium. All pupils were a credit to themselves and the school and brought back 11 gold, 3 silver and 1 bronze medal.

Football News

St. Mungo's has always had a strong tradition of football and has seen its fair share of success in competitions. The efforts this year have coincided with unprecedented successes across our teams.

Our school was represented in the Forth Valley League competitions at Under 13, 14, 15 and Senior boys, and U15 and Senior girls. The opportunities for participation at our school have been increased thanks to a programme of regular training sessions and team meetings aimed at educating the pupils in tactics and performance. The rewards of this extra

input have been clear and many of our teams have reached the latter stages of the competitions.

Our Under 13, 14 and 15



boys' teams all reached the final of their leagues. While the 14's were unfortunate to lose their final on penalties, the 13's and 15's earned fantastic victories. The under 14 team went on to compete in the final of the East Stirlingshire cup and were again unfortunate to lose this game. Our boys' teams also gave a good account of themselves in the national Scottish Cup competition, but the greatest success in that tournament goes to our Senior Girls team.

The Senior Girls team have consistently performed to a very high standard this year and have fully deserved their place in the final of the Scottish Cup. The team have played some fantastic football and earned a number of great victories on the road to the the music department which they themselves, very final.

On the back of these achievements we have organised an amazing football development tour with look ahead to another exciting development; the Inspire Sports that will see 48 pupils and 5 staff travel to Villarreal FC in Spain in Easter 2012. The hope is to give further motivation for our pupils as they look to improve themselves both personally and in sporting terms.

Staff Health and Wellbeing

Health and well-being opportunities for staff were a priority this session. Staff have had the opportunity to take part in a number of activities including Zumba, Body Balance, Wii fitness, Table Tennis, Badminton, Football, Swimming, Mountain Biking. There is also a timetable for staff to use the pool and fitness suite. Staff have also had the opportunity to receive a beauty treatment which included the

choice of back, neck or shoulder massage, an Indian head massage, a file and polish or an arm and hand massage. Others have been involved in making hand creams using aromatherapy oils.

Biophotonic Scanner

Staff were given the opportunity to have their antioxidant levels checked through a biophotonic scanner. Susan Mollison, director of Sumo therapy clinic came into school on 12th May and scanned 16 of St Mungo's staff. Susan also discussed some of the ways in which staff can improve their level of anti-oxidants, for example, by eating more fruit and vegetables, drinking more water, exercising more or reducina stress levels.

Susan will re-scan the same people in approximately 3 months time to see if they have been able to increase their level of anti-oxidants by making changes in their lifestyles.

St Mungo's Music Festival

This year sees the fourth consecutive year of St Mungo's Annual PTA music festival. The event begun back in 2008 in the old St Mungo's building. It was so successful we decided to make it an annual event. The festival provides a platform from which instrumental players can showcase their musical talents. The difficult and honourable position of adjudicator goes out to a different person each year who provides each player with feedback on their performance to encourage and challenge the young musicians towards their musical goals.

Our associate primaries were invited to join in the musical celebration. Young players from the local primary schools give their own performances for the adjudicator. They are able to spend the morning soaking up the musical atmosphere, and exploring soon, would be a part of.

As the Music festival moves into its fourth year, we · advanced instrumental class. This class has been created to allow those pupils who have attained musical success beyond their years to perform

competitively and excel. As the musical successes of the school build we anticipate many more years of rich musical culture and exciting performances.



A Busy Year at St Joseph's

We have a very active Eco and Pupil Council who have consulted with their peers, using questionnaires, and the idea box to get their views on what would make their playground more exciting, and would also get everyone more active.

This has resulted in the school having a large range of Playground games purchased by the pupils, and thanks to the Parent Council applying for a £10,000 grant from Awards from All a fantastic Adventure Trail. This ensures that all children take part in high energy activities that are fun but also develop their fitness levels.

Charity

This year the pupils and parents of St. Joseph's have given very generously to our charity fund raising events and campaigns. We also had a bottle in school and many pupils did without their 'tuck' at playtime, giving their money to Mary's Meals. We learned that it costs £9.40 to feed school meals to a child in Africa for a whole year. We realised we had raised enough money to help about 30 children. That's a whole class! Alongside Mary's Meals campaign P7 organised to help the 'Children Helping Children' charity. They collected money by visiting each class every day during Lent to collect money. They raised £200. This was sent to a school in Kenya run by the Celesian Sisters. P7 had been communicating with this school via e-mail as part of their Social Studies topic on The Third World. The



money will help to improve the conditions for the children in this school. On the 19th March, the feast of St. Joseph, we had a talent competition and a 'crazy hair' day which raised

£247 for Comic Relief. This term we auctioned a signed, framed Celtic picture to raise money for CLIC Sargent. The highest bidder donated £250 which we will present to the charity during our assembly in June. Well done St. Joseph's!

Health Week

The children and staff had a fun packed time during their annual Health Week. Each class was given an aspect of the Health and Wellbeing framework to research, taking ownership and deciding on the best way to present their learning in an interesting and informative way to the rest of the school.

P1 worked hard learning how to deal with changing emotions. The children presented their work to the rest of the school by discussing a time they felt happy, sad, angry and worried. They sang If You are Happy and You Know It and a song called Feelings.

P2/1 were learning about staying safe and mental, emotional, social and physical wellbeing. They

created a role play which showed the other children how to keep themselves safe when travelling on the school bus. They even made up their own song! P3/2 taught us all about the human body. We learned what we need to maintain and improve our wellbeing and health. The class spilt into groups and each group researched a different bit of the body and presented it to us through posters and songs.

P4 focused on friendships from the relationships, sexual health and parenthood aspect. They discussed positive things about friendships and relationships, that there are a wide range of different kinds of friendships and most importantly that we are all unique and special.

P5 enjoyed learning about nutrition from the Food and Health section of Health and Wellbeing. They discovered that our nutritional needs change throughout our life. Through giant fruit, vegetables, carbohydrates and meat posters the class presented to us the different range of foods available and how they contribute to a healthy diet.

P6 also focused on food and health on the journey the food makes, seasonality, local availability and sustainability. They studied food labels to understand how to use them to make healthy food choices. P6 entertained us with the raps that they had created! P7 studied substance misuse and interested and shocked us with their facts on the effects of tobacco and alcohol on our body. They told us about the impact that substance misuse can have. P7 detailed the actions we should take if we feel forced into substance misuse and who to contact in an emergency.

Not only did we work hard in class to research and work together in order to learn this information but we also took part in several physical activities including a session with a dance teacher, mini Olympics, playing on our new adventure trail each day and Top Sport.

We had a fantastic time during our food tasting sessions and discovered new foods that are not only very healthy but also very tasty too!

We completed our Health Week with a long healthy walk to Jenny's Park and played there for the morning as a celebration. In the afternoon each class

presented their learning to the rest of the school, showing off their expertise in that area.

We can't wait for next year!



ST. PATRICK'S QUEST FOR THIRD GREEN FLAG

St.Patricks Primary pupils have been busy again this year, with lots of eco activities. We hope to achieve our third green flag for the school. We received our first green flag in June 2007.

In the last few years we have achieved many excellent awards and improvements in our school playground. We hope to continue this fabulous work with the help of Morrison's vouchers. We have now by extending our eco knowledge in the future.

70 young trees were planted last year in the school grounds and we have been looking after them sensibly and they have really sprouted since they were planted. We have also planted 200 bulbs amongst the trees to encourage insects.

The school staff and pupils have also been busy with a wild flower garden to promote 'Save the Wee Bees! 'We had many species of bees and various insects in our flower garden last year.

St. Patrick's is one of ten schools in Scotland selected to be part of the School's Orchard Project and are being supported by an Advisor from Grounds for Learning, the national school grounds charity.

We are researching, designing and even planting the orchard.

Two years ago a lady came into the school and told us the bad points of dog fouling. She gave our teachers slips about Green Dog Walkers to hand out at parents' night. It was a huge success! We have been awarded a Green Dog Walkers Award.

Also last year we voted for what we wanted new in our school. The choices were: an all weather

football pitch, an outdoor classroom or more equipment for the school playground - we all decided on the outdoor classroom which we will have built before the end of this session. The PTA will kindly pay for this.

We have also received lots of compost and seeds planted these.

We have been learning about the infamous Japanese Knotweed project, which is very local, especially around the River Carron. It is 7 metres wide and 3 metres long, when the wind blows it blows the Knotweed seeds and they scatter all around the Carron and kill other plants.

Work has started on our willow structure funded by a grant from Earlsburn Windfarms and arranged by the PTA. We should all be willow experts soon!

The school orchard project is being supported by the National Lottery through the Heritage Lottery Fund and is part financed by the Scottish Government and the European Community Forth Valley and Lomond LEADER 2007-2013 Programme.















St Andrew's Primary Health Weeks and Health Days

Throughout the session, we plan a number of Health focus days and weeks. We are fortunate to be able to call on help from a range of health

professionals who help make keeping fit and healthy a pleasurable experience; our Active Schools Coordinator, our school nurse. dental nurse, road safety officer, our cook and catering services and several sports coaches who enjoy working with our pupils.

This session the children were involved in a variety of new experiences; zumba, tae kwon do, orienteering, canoeing and mountain biking. We





Outdoor Learning

Throughout the session all classes have been making the most of opportunities to take learning outdoors. Some members of staff have attended national training courses and are keen to use the school grounds and local area for enterprising learning and teaching. All classes have used the school grounds for maths, writing poetry, making dens, science, eco initiatives and of course, sport!

Some of our P7 pupils have trained as Garden Guides for the walled garden in Callendar Park. The children are now confident in taking round small groups of pupils or adults and teaching them about the plants there. All P7 pupils also went walking, mountain biking, canoeing and kayaking locally. It was a real challenge and helped build their confidence for leaving us and starting high school. Next month P7 will be going on a week long residential course to the National Sport Training facility at Inverclyde to further develop their sporting skills and self esteem!

Our P6 pupils also enjoyed a day packed with outdoor activities at Muiravonside Country Park and enjoyed mountain biking, canoeing and a



farm visit. The children (and teachers) reported it was the best school trip they'd ever been on! It was helped by the fact that the sun shone!

Callendar Park

P5 have been learning about Global Warming and they visited Callendar Park with the ranger. He showed them the effects of global warming.

All classes have made use of Callendar Park to enhance their work; walks, Roman workshops, WW II workshop, Victorians workshop. Our P3 pupils

Our Eco group have continued their efforts to make the school litter free. P2-P5 classes allocate a litter picker person everyday and P1-5 classes also allocate an Energy Buster. Their job is to be vigilant to staff or pupils wasting electricity, water or paper.


Book Week 21st-25th March


We are very proud of our Cross Country choose Team who has enjoyed huge successes over the last couple of months. Throughout the trials for

Rich Tasks


Homework grids were developed for each task providing pupils with a variety of written and creative activities to choose from.


