Fringe Festival Art and **Design Success**

I am a visiting Art Specialist / Primary Teacher working for Falkirk Council. I work in 4 different primary schools. At the beginning of term, in January, I worked with all my classes over about 5 weeks to create entries for the Annual Edinburgh Fringe Poster competition, using some of the fantastic support materials that were supplied by the competition organisers. Looking at past winners' posters I was aware that a Primary child had not won this competition since 2005.

opportunities to learn about an important part of our Scottish Culture, and raise the profile of this arts festival with the children. We looked at photographs of images from the Fringe from past years and the children gained an understanding of how diverse it is, and how it appeals to people of all ages. I encouraged them to be really creative, and to use humour in their artwork, as much of the festival has that unrestrained 'wild and

then came up with 4 possible design solutions inspired by some of the images and conversations we one of their designs, explaining what it was about that one that they preferred.

We evaluated work by past winners and considered what materials had been used to create the artwork. and how it had been put together. 
Kinnaird Jubilee Celebrations


Kinnaird PS were only one of a high number of primary schools which participated in the celebrations....we heard that over 10,000 pupils had a party meal that day.




Well done Bo'ness Academy for beating some stiff competition and ending up as runners up in this prestigious national competition.

Westquarter Jubilee Celebrations



- 1.1 A tender for the Deep Cleaning of Kitchens and Canopies as part of a Framework Agreement was advertised through the Public Contracts Scotland Portal as an open tender. Subsequently thirty-eight companies expressed an interest in tendering.
- 1.2 The framework will commence on 1st September 2012 and will run for four years until 31st August 2016.

2. TENDERS RECEIVED

- 2.1 Six tenders were received by the due date of 5th July 2012 and opened in accordance with Standing Order 11.2 relating to contracts.
- 2.2 The checked tendered prices ranged from £48,720 to £128,640 per annum.
- Following evaluation of all tenders, the four highest scoring tenders were selected offering best value across the full range of the contract. The tenders are detailed at Appendix 1, with an estimated annual value of £50,000. This represents a saving of approximately 5.5% against current contracted rates.
- 2.4 In accordance with Standing Order 6.2(ii) relating to contracts, the approval of the Chief Governance Officer to enter into contract with that party was sought and received.

3. ACTION TAKEN

3.1 In accordance with Standing Order 6.2(ii), I accepted the tenders submitted as detailed in Appendix 1 with an approximate total contract value of £200,000 in respect of the Deep Cleaning of Kitchens, Cleaning of Kitchen Canopies (including Ductwork & Filters) as part of a Framework Agreement to Falkirk Council.
