He is very enthused by this project and was impressed with The Falkirk Council Concert held last night displaying the local talent in the area.

In preparation for this event, Brian will send the music to the Graeme High School Music Department and the teachers will be responsible for teaching the pupils their parts which will come together as large ensemble incorporating young musicians from the area, there will be a rehearsal the week before the event to allow pupils to see how their part fits within the ensemble.

Brian said last night "I want to involve every pupil in the Falkirk area who can hold an instrument regardless

of their level of talent and the music will be written in this accessible manner."

She brought in pictures from a collection her own Dad had kept of the Polmont High Street. There have been many changes over the past 45 years and Mrs Bell spoke to the children about where the old school was adjacent the church, a hotel that is no longer here and stories about milk tokens too! P3 have also been walking round the local area to identify where old buildings have been and looked at new housing developments that are now in place. There used to be an Orchard in Polmont which is no longer there but where it was, is now called Orchard Grove!

Literacy Event

The RACI Literacy Team led a session with parents/carers about the delivery of Active Literacy. Sharon Wallace (Curriculum Support Officer) delivered the presentation. The Event was exceptionally well received by all who were in attendance. The comments made through the self evaluation process could not have been more positive and appreciative. Parents/carers did feel included; more informed and were able to experience first hand, the activities undertaken by the children on a daily basis. Some of the children presented at the session and as always were expert ambassadors for our school! Thank you to Sharon Wallace and the staff who attended the evening.

Stuart Reid

Stuart Reid ,an author from our local area, has been working with P5 & P6 to inspire them with story writing. The children were dazzled with Stuart's enthusiasm and wrote some exciting short stories using their VCOP strategies to engage the reader. Thank you to Stuart for his time and inspirational sessions.

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Laurieston School Makes a Difference

At school assemblies in Laurieston Primary, children often sing *"I can make a difference, you can make a difference, we can make a difference in this world of ours!"*

A project which is currently being undertaken in school is allowing the children to research, remember and commemorate the impact of Laurieston pupils from one hundred years ago.

1914 marks the centenary of the outbreak of the First World War and P6 pupils have been learning about the war and its impact on former pupils of the school through a joint project led by Laura McDonald and Louise Tierney from the heritage learning team at Callendar House.

From 1914-18, Mr James Mather, the headmaster of Laurieston School, compiled an album of photos of some former pupils who served in the war. He recorded whether these former pupils returned home safely or whether they sadly lost their lives. This album is held by Falkirk Archives at Callendar House. In Laurieston School, we currently hold the original school logbooks* beginning in 1896. The entries covering the war years were written by Mr Mather and include references to a number of these former pupils who visited the school during this period and were presented with gifts in recognition of their achievements. Mr Mather's legacy has left a rich historical resource and this has been the basis for the project with Laura and Louise.

Children have worked in co-operative groups to be history detectives and use resources to research the impact of the First World War on eight former pupils, (including a family of three brothers). The children have also worked with a storyteller and artist to create 'memory box' exhibits of their findings. Later in the year these will go on display as part of a travelling exhibition around a number of community venues including the Hippodrome Cinema, Forth Valley Hospital and local libraries.

The stories of the former pupils include that of James Fitz Morris. He joined the army as a dispatch rider, but by 1917, aged just 20, was a Captain in the Royal Flying Corps. He was awarded the Military Cross with bar and was mentioned in dispatches. He also received the Belgian Croix de Guerre. In May 1918 he returned to Laurieston School and was presented with gifts in recognition of his achievements. *"I am very proud to be a former pupil of this school and shall carry your gifts with me wherever I go",* he said.

Sadly James died in a flying accident in the Cincinnati in August 1918. He was on a tour around American cities with the British Aviation Mission. However one of the most inspiring stories was not of a soldier but of a nurse, Margaret Crowe. Margaret attended Laurieston School as a child and

in 1897 was employed as a pupil teacher at the school. She later trained to be a nurse and in 1915 joined Dr Elsie Inglis who established the Scottish Women's Hospitals for Overseas Service. Margaret travelled with Elsie as part of a team of nurses to work in Serbia. For her work there Margaret was awarded the Serbian Cross of Mercy. She



also took part in the Great Serbian Retreat and in Feb 1916 returned to Laurieston School to talk to pupils about her experiences. She later served with the SWH in Russia returning to Laurieston School at the end of the war to talk to pupils.

Today the SWH and its doctors and nurses are still remembered in Serbia, but most people in Scotland know little about them. P6 children were amazed to learn about what this Laurieston former pupil had done and had questions about what happened to her after the war. The answers to their questions came in a very exciting way!

A TV researcher who was filming a documentary about the SWH and Scottish / Serbian links, contacted Mrs Jane Smith, the great niece of Nurse Crowe! Mrs Smith came to Laurieston School with many photos of her great aunt in Serbia and Russia, which she has kindly gifted to the school. She was also able to talk with the children about her own memories of her great aunt.

Mrs Smith said that she felt her great aunt would have been "tickled pink" that after 100 years this former Laurieston pupil was being remembered and her achievements recognised at her old school. Over 400 former pupils of Laurieston School served in the First World War and over 160 are recorded in Mr Mather's album, each with a story to tell. Thanks to Laura and Louise this project is allowing Laurieston pupils of today to discover them.

*Thanks to a grant from Falkirk Community Schools 2008 Charity, and support from Capture All, these logbooks have been digitised and the originals will be presented to Falkirk Council Archivist at the end of this project."

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Engaging Everyone Whitecross Community



At Whitecross Primary and Nursery we are working with our whole community to enhance the educational experiences for our children. The Community Learning Teams initiative promotes environmental

awareness in a way that not only links to many curricular areas but also involves the whole community - staff, pupils, parents, people and businesses in the local area.

When we started this project the aim was to encourage teamwork, develop enterprising attitudes and skills, provide more opportunities for choice and participation in decision making to help create a shared understanding of what it takes to run a school - respecting and enhancing our physical and learning environment.

Every child from Nursery to P7 is involved: 'Children's leadership and entrepreneurial skills are well developed through their involvement in Learning Teams. Commendably, nursery children are also involved in the school's learning teams.' HMIe.

What do our teams do?

The Outdoor Education Team leads the

development of our playground and outdoor areas for learning. The outdoors and local area are very well used to enhance learning experiences for children" HMIe. ... and we won the Helix sponsored Learning to Achieve Award in the Environment, Heritage and International Education category.

Working with parents they secured funding of £1,000 to provide a storage shed for equipment

and a supply of wellies! Their latest project involves exploring how to use the wider local area including Muiravonside Country Park to provide



further learning opportunities in the 'outdoor classroom'.

Our **Eco Team** works hard to ensure that our Eco Action Plan continues to have a high impact in school to meet all our Eco targets. As well as

recycling and keeping the school community aware of environmental issues they encourage children and adults to walk whenever possible and organise our annual Big Fit Walk for the whole school along the Canal to Muiravonside Park. They have also 'Switch off and Save' policy in school and at home to save energy including a mass switch off for Earth

Hour. They have their own 'garden' in the playground and grow fruit and vegetables which they harvest and cook. This year they have made



apple crumble, leek and potato soup and vegetable soup. Their creative ideas are supported by everyone and we have just been awarded our second Green Flag!

To promote good health the **Healthy Eating Team** encourages our community to eat healthy snacks



and drink plenty of water instead of fizzy drinks. They cook healthy snacks and share their recipes. They organise and run a 'Healthy Food Bar' supported by parents, often selling the healthy snacks they have just made! They promote Waste Free

Lunches and give advice about healthy packed lunches at assemblies.

At present they are consulting with all stakeholders to develop a healthy snack policy for the whole school and have just been awarded £2,500 to run a healthy breakfast club next year.

Fun United organises events for the whole community with a focus on Reading and Literacy. So far this year they have organised a very successful Literacy Day which saw the school packed with parents and friends all trying out activities with a Roald Dahl theme! They organised a Book Launch where every child presented their own book to their guests and a Come and Read

event and book swap for World Book Day. They have negotiated with Scholastic Books to donate a free book for every book purchased at the Book Fair and earlier in the year they managed to talk the head teacher into providing funds to invite two authors into school, one who was also a graphic artist, to run workshops for every class which everyone loved.

They have also been involved in redesigning our Library and enjoyed choosing to spend a 'budget' on



more comfortable seating!

The **Community Links Team** visit our local Care



Home to spend time with the residents and have been involved in designing and building a garden for them. The team members wrote to everyone they could think of and

got donations towards the garden project from many local businesses – and larger firms too including Homebase, Sainsbury's and IKEA! One of our grand parents, who has his own taxi firm, provided the transport to and from the care home, the Lowport Centre in Linlithgow donated canoes which the children turned into planters and another parent who works for the Co-op got them to donate a special bench so that the residents could sit out, watch the birds and enjoy the garden. A special plaque was 'commissioned' for the garden and everyone is delighted with the results.

A new Learning Team has been created this session to co-ordinate the school's approach to the Commonwealth Games Project, our **Going for Glasgow Team**!

The **Team Managers** encourage and motivate, feedback to the whole school at Assembly, and

evaluate each activity.

The **Events Managers** consult with other teams, carry out surveys on the types of events we would like, handle information and decide on events.

The **Marketing Team** design posters for advertising including in local businesses, send out invitations to the wider community, make/order badges, labels and tickets and contact the local press for publicity.

The **Finance Team** research any costs involved and write to sponsors for funding. The Stewards plan, including risk assessments, organise and implement the actual events.

This year they have raised awareness of the Commonwealth Games through a 'Sport Your Trainers' day and recently launched our 'Going For Glasgow' project to parents and friends by organising a sponsored obstacle/circuit course. Although many parents attended – no one actually tried the course! They did give lots of encouragement to all the children who took part from Nursery to P7 and contributed towards raising a massive £641.65 for Sports relief – which was an amazing effort for our 'wee school'.

The team were also busy making flags and banners to wave our 'baton bearers' off on Friday 25th April to start the Graeme Cluster Baton relay round the cluster schools.



Our Community Learning Teams have become a popular whole school approach to community projects involving many parents and grandparents. A notice board and regular newsletter help to keep everyone up to date with what is happening and why and to get suggestions for new activities. The aims of the Community Learning Teams were always laudable but the amount of community involvement and support has been a huge bonus and a major factor in their success.

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Learning Games on a Commonwealth Exchange

When Westquarter Primary teacher Karen Bell approached her head teacher with the news that she would like to take part in the Commonwealth Exchange Programme neither of them knew exactly what lay ahead but both agreed that it would be an invaluable experience for both Karen professionally and for the school culturally. Once the decision was made and the necessary permission granted by Falkirk Council, the wheels were put in motion and the process begun. A candidate from Bowral, Australia, Mrs. Lynette Williams, registered interest and was put in touch with both Karen and the school. Game on!

In January 2013, Lynette Williams and Karen Bell swapped lives (but not husbands!) for a year. They exchanged houses, cars, jobs and colleagues and so began their great adventure.

Senior members of the Pupil Council, Alecia, Cameron and Stella, interviewed Mrs. Williams at the end of her time at Westquarter and Mrs. Bell on her return. Here is what they found out....

Mrs. Williams chose to take part in the exchange for a number of reasons: she likes to travel, enjoys a challenge and her daughter is living in Edinburgh at the moment so it was a fantastic opportunity to combine the things she loves to do and take up the

position at Westquarter Primary for a year.

This her third exchange and each experience has been different, once to a high school, once to a junior high (both in England) and now to a primary in Scotland. She would absolutely recommend it to anyone thinking of taking part in the exchange programme as you have a chance to live someone else's life – in their house, their job and with their



friends. It can be the highlight of your life and you don't have to be young to do it; it's great at any time in your career. You travel, you see the

world and it's a big adventure.

When asked what she had learned here Mrs. Williams told the Pupil Council that she really liked the way the citizenships groups are run and the sense of belonging that this and the house system gives children. They can work together and everyone has something to aim for. She enjoyed

the developmental work she has been involved in, both in literacy and self-evaluation. Her own experience in teaching meant she could share valuable insights, especially in the use of poetry to develop higher order skills. As you can imagine, "The Wee Malkies" was an altogether new experience, one which she is taking back to Bowral with her.

Mrs. Williams was generous in her praise of Westquarter. She told Cameron, Stella and Alicia that she wouldn't change a thing about Westquarter School, they have a caring head teacher, dedicated staff, lovely children and a building with facilities which were much nicer than those of her own school. She would have changed the weather if she could (wouldn't we all!) but recognised that although we had a lot of rain it was better than the huge droughts she had experienced in Australia. At the time of her interview Mrs. Williams was excited to be going home as she missed her friends and family. She also missed being able to eat outdoors, go swimming at her local outdoor pool and just have her own things around her.

What of Mrs. Bell? How did she find the exchange experience? On her return here is what she shared with the Pupil Council...

Mrs. Bell wanted to experience learning in a different country, comparing similarities and differences with those in Scotland. She felt she had arrived in Bowral at just the right time as the Australian Government was putting a new curriculum in place. Up until last year each state had its own education system and curriculum. When Mrs. Bell arrived it was at the beginning of a

new National Curriculum. The new curriculum shared the rationale of the Scottish Curriculum for Excellence but whereas the Curriculum for Excellence presented teachers with the experiences and outcomes for all areas of the curriculum, Australia favours introducing subjects annually:



this year English, next year Maths. Mrs. Bell felt the curriculum is also more prescriptive than in Scotland.

Mrs. Bell had a P6 class of well-mannered, hardworking children. She introduced them to the use of flip cameras and blogging (no one there had a blog). She also informed the children that in Bowral the pupils had to pay for all the resources they used – pens, pencils, jotters, textbooks etc. She felt that as a result this encouraged better care and use of materials. Good handwriting was a focus and children worked towards gaining their pen licence. The pen licence was only granted when your written work reached a set standard and once reached all work was then completed in pen.

If she could have changed anything Mrs. Bell would have introduced central resources for the school as each staff member had to have their own materials and she arrived with nothing to start her off! Whilst the other teachers helped with what they could Mrs. Bell thought that would help everyone.

Mrs. Bell felt that the children at Bowral were very fortunate and had many opportunities to do extracurricular activities. One of her school highlights was seeing children from her class singing in Sydney Opera House!

Away from school it had been strange at first to be in someone else's house and only two suitcases for the year! She printed off family photos to put around the house. Mrs. Williams had a big garden and Mrs. Bell had no gardening skills. She had taken up more outdoor activities but felt the garden was too much and hired a gardener! Above all the weather was great and lots of sunshine made you feel good.

Stella asked Mrs. Bell if she would do it again. Mrs. Bell did not hesitate and said yes, it was a great professional and personal experience. She had stepped out of her comfort zone and realised that she could do it. She is also looking forward to bringing some of her new found knowledge of another culture back to share with her classes at Westquarter.

The Pupil Council would like to thank both ladies for their time and their willingness to share their experiences. Should anyone be considering a similar adventure we are sure Karen would be happy to share her experiences.

We invited Jon from 'Think Science' to Bantaskin for the Falkirk Science Festival. Jon brought along some interesting equipment and showed all of our pupils the different things that science is responsible for. The children loved watching his show, which for some of the younger ones almost seemed like magic. The pupils in P3L, P3/4Mc and P4R used this as a base for some further investigation in their homework and tried out some of the experiments with parents showing them what



they had learned. A great day was had by all pupils and staff involved and hopefully it has encouraged some of our budding scientists of

the future. Thank you to Jon for sharing his enthusiasm for science and making this such a success.

Cross Country

Bantaskin children value the opportunities they are given to keep fit and healthy. 38 children from the upper school participated in this year's cross country events and all their dedication and hard work paid off. Many of the children improved their fitness levels and their scores as the season progressed. This attributed to our P5 girls coming



second place overall and Inez McIntosh, P6 gaining an individual award for second place overall.

Bantaskin Primary School Show 2014

In February 2014, the talented P4-P7 pupils of Bantaskin Primary put on a spectacular production of the musical comedy show, 'Pirates of the Currybean.' The three shows: two evening and one matinee were the culmination of 4 months of hard work. As well as rehearsals this included; costume, set and prop making, marketing and publicity. The efforts of pupils and staff paid off on the nights as show-goers were hugely impressed by the acting and singing talent displayed on stage. The volunteers, Lynne Reid and John Owen, farm locally, with Lynne having a dairy farm and John raising beef cattle and various poultry.

RHET Forth Valley coordinator, Christine Struthers, worked with teachers to organise a visit to Bantaskin PS by the farmers and their special fibreglass dairy cow, Valleri. Teaching in Forth Valley Royal Hospital gets a boost from SERCO

Eco Group Activities

This session our Eco Group have been working hard on a variety of projects. Early next session there will be an Eco



inspection for our third green flag. This term we held an Eco Week during which all classes have been involved in different Eco themed activities. There have been litter picks in the school grounds, Callendar Park, the Clean Zone (near the nursery) and Bellsmeadow. Jennifer Terris, Litter Education Officer, visited classes and told the story of King Wastealot to help understand how important it is to Reduce, Reuse and Recycle. Biannually the Eco Group also organises a Rag Bag Collection and funds raised are used to improve our playground and garden.



In class the children have been learning about looking after our environment. The Eco Group prepared and presented an assembly to

the rest of the school. Several surveys have been carried out to gather information in a range of areas we are trying to improve: snacks, use of blue bags and transport. 'Walk to School Wednesday' was a great success and pupils who were unable to walk to school completed a walking circuit during break time. P4, P5 and P7 helped out in our school

garden and potatoes, carrots, onions and flowers were planted.

The Eco Group prepared and sold plastic



tubs to encourage pupils to bring a wrapper free, healthy snack. Lots of classes had an information session about 'Milk' and even got the chance to milk a life size model cow! A 'Bling a Bottle' competition was held to see how creative our pupils can be, making something pretty out of rubbish. The week ended with a visit from 'Silly Billy' who presented an Eco themed show for our P1-P3 pupils and the children loved every minute of it.

Before Christmas the Eco Group organised a 'Swap It Day' for our P1-P5 classes. Pupils were invited to bring in a good quality toy or game they had finished with. P3 then sorted the toys and games and all children could choose one toy/game to take home. There were many happy smiling faces that day and not one penny was spent!

Health Promoting Activities

The pupils, parents and staff at St. Andrew's have been very busy this session with a wide range of health related activities, there has been something for everyone.

Lunch and After School Clubs

There are several lunch and after school clubs running for pupils. Staff, parents and even some of our senior pupils help to organise the clubs. Pupils can enjoy Table Tennis, Badminton, Cross Country, Football, Dance and Netball. These clubs are well attended and run weekly.

This session our P6-P7 pupils have also enjoyed attending a 'Glee Club' run by Miss Ross. The children have been learning and performing a range of contemporary songs. The Glee Club has also been singing in the Howgate and raising funds for three charities; MacMillan Cancer, Mary's Meals and SCIAF.

We are very proud of our Cross Country Team who has enjoyed huge successes over the last couple of

months. Throughout the trials for the Forth Valley Championships and in the finals held in March the team proved how talented they were. Well done!



Four of our P6 pupils attended a Dance training session with The Active Schools Team. These pupils now organise a weekly Lunchtime Dance

club for our P2, P3 and P4 pupils. Two of our P6 pupils also run a Lego Heroes Club twice weekly and they help the P2 and P3 pupils build interesting Lego models. Lunchtime can be guite long for younger pupils and these clubs keep our pupils busy and happy.

'The Big Scoot Aboot'

This session we started raising funds and saving for Throughout the session all classes have been a MUGA (multi-use games area). Our grassy pitch is out of bounds from late autumn to late spring due to being water-logged. The MUGA pitch would provide a year round area for play, learning and teaching for all.

At the end of March Mrs Jamieson organised a fun, healthy fundraising event entitled 'The Big Scoot Aboot'. Pupils chose one of three activities to participate in; scooting, cycling or running. The children brought their bikes and scooters to school and completed a course within the school grounds. Our runners completed a cross country course in Callendar Park which was exciting and different.

The children LOVED the event and were exhausted afterwards. Over £3,000 was raised and the money is being used to kick start the MUGA pitch fund and some is also being sent to The Scottish International Aid Fund.

Scottish Concerts

During November our pupils in P4-P7 took part in mini topics with a Scottish theme. Two concerts were also held for our parents and carers celebrating all things Scottish on the 29th and 30th of November. Our pupils excelled themselves by performing a range of traditional and contemporary Scottish songs, poetry and dance. Several pupils performed individually, showcasing the learning they do out of school as well: playing the clarsach, Highland dancing, electric guitar and so on. James Bundy, a pupil at St. Mungo's, kindly played the bagpipes for two, wonderful afternoons.

Opening of our Games Hall Extension

At the end of November. Archbishop Leo Cushlev visited the school to celebrate our St. Andrew's Day Mass and also to open the extension



to our new Games Hall. Archbishop Cushley is the newly appointed archbishop of the diocese of St. Andrew's and Edinburgh. Former headteachers, parent reps, pupils and staff attended the event and all were impressed with the improved space for learning and teaching.

Outdoor Learning

making the most of opportunities to learn outdoors. A team of four staff have been working together and great progress has been made.

Firstly, an audit was constructed and completed by all staff. Key areas were highlighted by the audit and the RACI team planned their work following the results of the audit. . A whole day inservice was held with support from Jane Jackson. St Mary's staff joined those at St. Andrew's and they were outdoors for most of the day learning about what a rich and stimulating environment there is on site and off site using Callendar Park. Staff have attended local and national courses and staff confidence has improved. The team also found a range of teaching materials online and they have been added to our Staff Shared area giving our teachers further inspiration for interesting lessons.

Staff worked together at a CAT session writing risk assessments which could be used for off site visits. A database of parent helpers for outdoor learning was established as well as an 'Outdoor Learning Contacts' database. Two rucksacks were filled for use off site as well as an Outdoor Learning Resource Box for staff to access with spotter sheets, binoculars, resource cards and so on.

Outdoor Learning is the responsibility of all staff and the team was keen for pupils to make better use of their break times. One member of the group researched the use of 'loose materials' for pupils to

play with creatively at break time. Eighteen large tyres were fitted together in groups and pupils happily play on these at every break. The RACI team



successfully submitted an application for a Community Grant and the money is will be used to buy a storage shed for the loose play materials.

Finally, the team was keen to involve our parents and an Outdoor Learning Parent and Child Workshop was held at the end of April. Our parents and pupils tried out a variety of activities with each group being led by a member of the RACI team. The event finished with toasting marshmallows on an open fire in our school grounds!

Planning procedures

Last year we made significant improvements to our planning approaches. We increased focus on learning intentions and success criteria, generating these effectively at the planning stages and ensuring they are embedded in the daily practice of class teachers. This proved to be a very successful development within our school priorities and so was extended for another year. We looked more carefully at the skills progression within and across the levels and considered how we ensure breadth across the curriculum. We decided it was important to streamline our attention so focused on science as this was one of the core areas in our interdisciplinary learning topics. The RACI team shared skills based learning intentions they created for each of the science learning outcomes from every area and level within science.

With the guidance of our RACI team and Yvonne McBlain from the Curriculum Support Team, we also began to explore the link between success criteria and evidence gathering and assessment within a lesson or series of lessons. This tied in with our developing understanding of the NAR planning flowchart and how this can be utilized to ensure coherence in our planning. We explored product and process success criteria and which method is clearer and easier for children to access in both summative and formative assessment within the classroom. Our children have benefitted greatly from this increased attention given to success criteria. This was evident when the children spoke about assessment in a pupil focus group led by the RACI team. The children identified that knowing how to be successful aided their self and peer assessment and helped them to generate success criteria for future lessons.

Science Rich Task

During our 'Science Rich Task' we established a 'Science Board' that consisted of an elected rep from each class and some experts in various scientific fields. The board looked at the plans the different year groups had produced and offered advice on experiments and the recording of results. Each class bundled together E's &O's from across science and literacy. The contexts for learning were as follows:

- ★ Primary 1- The Circus
- **\star** Primary 2 The Weather
- ★ Primary 3 Ready, Steady, Grow
- ★ Primary 4 The Human Body
- ★ Primary 5 Earth and Space
- ★ Primary 6 Eco-Systems
- ★ Primary 7 Bright Sparks

The Science board helped the children to enlist the help of companies and individuals in

Scotland that could assist with specific scientific topics.



The children and staff were delighted with the visitors who came to the school and their expertise was greatly appreciated.

P1 managed to convince members of the Circus to come and visit St Andrew's! P2, who studied Weather, really enjoyed the visit from 'Bear Scotland' and they learned about the use of salt and grit in icy conditions. They also had a visit from TV weatherman Alex Hill, who conducted a weather workshop in the classroom! Much to the delight of the children!

P3 visited the Park Ranger at Callander Park and also organised a trip to the Botanic Gardens in Edinburgh.

P4 arranged for the 'Bodyworks Science Centre' to visit the school and P5 had a visit from the Royal Observatory in Edinburgh!

P6 visited the Botanic Gardens and P7 arranged a visit from Generation Science, who conducted a workshop called 'Power from the People'. P7



also spoke to representatives from Griffin Windfarm.

The children were given the role of tour guides who explained the learning associated with the relevant displays and the teachers dressed up as scientists to mark the occasion!

Parental Partnership

Within St Andrew's Nursery we have been working hard to encourage our parents to become more involved in the day to day activities within the nursery and working with us to take forward the Learning Journeys. We now have a healthy list of parents who support us with our lending library and accompany us on our weekly outdoor sessions.

Feedback from them continues to be extremely positive.

"I look forward to going to Callander Park with the nursery, it's great for the children" "It's good to see the children in another setting".

Engaging parents with the Learning Journeys and encouraging them to add to their child's Journey is crucial. We have successfully built in 'sharing sessions' into the nursery day to give the parents quality time to look at their Learning Journeys with their child and their key worker. We periodically send home 'Star Moments' sheets for children and parents to discuss and fill in.

As a team we enjoy sharing successes of the children. Star moments have ranged from learning to ride a bike, helping with a new baby, moving up a We then used blindfolds to heighten our listening level in swimming and counting to ten without help. The Star Moment wall is a prominent feature in the nurserv and the children are also featured on the nursery website.

Our parents also got involved in November by sponsoring children to take part in our Wacky Day fundraiser. The children (and staff) attended the nursery in wacky clothes and had crazy hair for the day. Some even wore odd shoes to complete their outfits. We managed to raise £818

French lessons

Our children have been learning French, thanks to our weekly lessons from Mme Liz and Mme Gio. The lessons include learning about colours,

During our planning sessions this year, we have identified and focused on the Es & Os, developing a wide range of knowledge and skills - following the children's' interests. Pupils' voice is gathered from our floorbooks and the Learning Journeys.

Recently the children have learned about their senses. On Walking Wednesday, we walked

through the school grounds looking all around us. We closed our eves and listened to the sounds. We touched different surfaces and described how they felt. We smelled the



flowers in the garden.

In the nursery we played listening games. We made 'moonsand' from flour and oil and discussed how it felt. We used the feely box, played a memory game and smelled different containers to guess what was in them. All our activities were supported by fact books and internet clips.

The Yellow group learned more about their senses during their session in Callendar Park. The children used magnifying glasses to explore the environment, used their hands to feel and sorted them into groups soft, hard, bumpy and smooth. skills, we could hear the birds singing, an

aeroplane, a dog, twigs snapping and leaves rustling. At the end of the session the children had gained trust in each other and auided their blindfolded partner around the woods.



Our parent helpers even got involved trusting the children to quide them blindfolded.

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St. Joseph's is Going for Glasgow!


