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

Recycling the Right Materials in the Right Container and Are You Ready?

Back in October a weekly food waste service was introduced at schools to meet the requirements of the Waste (Scotland) Regulations 2012. The new service has been a great success with approximately 60 tonnes of food waste collected for recycling. This is a fantastic achievement and Waste Strategy would like to thank schools for their continued support.

The introduction of food waste recycling has encouraged schools to increase their recycling efforts. As a result a number of schools have been asking for clarification on the type of materials they can recycle in the blue bin. Some schools have only been using the blue bins to recycle paper and cardboard, resulting in valuable materials ending up in the landfill bin. Last year the Council spent £1.4 million sending materials to landfill which could have been recycled. As a result it has never been more important for schools to recycle the right materials in the right containers.

You can recycle paper, cardboard, food and drinks cans, plastic bottles and containers, and juice cartons in your blue bin. To help schools a new blue bin guidance poster has been created.

Are you ready? Information about the changes to the household waste collection service

On 12th May, the way we collect waste from households is to change. The new service will involve green bin collections moving from every two weeks to every three weeks in the communities of Larbert, Stenhousemuir, Airth, Carronshore, Carron and Bo'ness. All other recycling collections are to remain the same with food waste being collected every week and the blue bin, brown bin, black box and textile bag every two weeks.

Changes to the collection services will be actively promoted through a comprehensive communications plan starting at the end of March. Schools in the affected areas will be a key part of helping to raise awareness and understanding among the local community. It is important that pupils are able to take home the message by using the existing recycling collection services in the household, particularly the food waste recycling service.

The Waste Strategy team will be contacting schools in the affected areas to ask if they would like an officer to come along and talk to the pupils and staff about the changes to the collection services. If you have any questions you can

Big Maths

Over the course of the past 8 months children at Airth Primary School have been working extremely hard to develop their confidence in mental maths through the use



of **Big Maths**. During this period of time pupils have been undertaking daily CLIC sessions that have helped them to develop their confidence in: place value; total recall of key number facts; mental math strategies and calculations.

Through these daily mental maths sessions pupils have been challenged to level up their thinking and develop their mental processes. Pupils' progress has been tracked through two challenges on a Friday that tests individual's total recall of key facts as well as their ability to apply mental strategies within calculations. These results have shown a greater engagement with learning leading to a significant improvement in attainment. Ben in P6 said "Our lessons seem to fly by because we are having fun and being challenged."

During the implementation of Big maths parents have been informed of changes and developments to their children's curriculum. In November, a very successful workshop was held for over 50 parents who were led through a series of activities by P5-7 pupils. Mrs. Anderson a P4 and P6 parent said "My children are benefitting from Big maths and it's great to see the school at the forefront of something new."

Most importantly the impact of these changes has been felt within the day to day learning of children across the school. Michael (P7) said "We can all see we are getting better at doing calculations in our heads" whilst Helena (P6) explained that "the activities have made more people confident and as a result we all now look forward to maths." With pupils feeling confident in their own abilities, engaging fully with strategies and attainment improving we are certainly on the right road to success for all of our children.


Sport Your Trainers Day 2014


Airth Primary Health Group planned a fantastic Sport Your Trainers Day for the whole school to take part in on Monday 10th March. Have a read at some of the super things we did!

friendly video of a children's ward and the children were able to ask lots of questions.

We were then invited to make a magazine for the children's ward to

help entertain any children who were admitted for any time. We looked at samples of previous magazines and we discussed possible articles that would be suitable for a range of ages and interests. We also gave each group a job such as editors, illustrators and discussed what might be involved for each area of responsibility. Over the next

couple of weeks the children worked to produce a variety of articles, including designing their own front covers.

The children were delighted to be invited to spend a morning at the



hospital. They were made very welcome and given hot chocolate and a snack. We were shown round the kitchens, children's ward, the robot area and the shopping area. We handed over our magazines knowing they would be welcomed by children on the wards.

This was a very useful activity to be involved in and covered many areas of the curriculum.

Our children have been so engaged in this learning that we have decided to build on the magazine and add more articles, interviews etc. and turn it into a school magazine which we can share with our whole school community.

Change through consultation and creativity

Airth's nursery team (consisting of pupils, parents and staff) has been committed to improving the nursery over the past year. The main catalyst for change has come from consultation with pupils and parents. This has resulted in significant changes in relation to three broad themes; the nursery

environment, the learning taking place and the pedagogical approaches used to facilitate the learning. Central to our ambitious improvement



plan has been gathering parents' views (e.g., through focus groups, coffee and cake mornings and 'Sharing the Learning' events) and perhaps more importantly, children's views (e.g., regularly using Talking Mats, mindmapping techniques and Floor books).

The consultation process has also directly resulted in

building positive partnerships with Airth families. We have used this relationship to take a creative approach to nursery planning and profiling; child and family voice is now at the centre of these approaches, and our new formats allow us to frame children's views and emerging interests within the structure of Curriculum for Excellence.

The impact the changes have had on our nursery are best seen through the children's and parents' comments:

"I love my new nursery" [child]

"Planning with the children is MEANINGFUL! A lot of careful thought is evident in your new approach. The children seem happy and have meaningful choice."

"I love the new nursery layout. There's now a great new learning structure and a wide range of activities" [parent]

"I really love the new profile format. Normally profiles just cover the main things but this captures a real sense of how he is doing and the things we all need to work on" [parent]

"Listening! We have clearly been listened to and improvements are obvious" [parent]

The "new" nursery is 5 star! Staff have clearly worked very hard and the results are excellent – well done!" [parent]

Parents and nursery staff are now working together to support individual children on their journey through their early years and beyond. Although this is an on-going process, there are exciting times ahead for Airth Nursery!

P7 RSPB Project

Over the last few months, P7s at Airth Primary have been working with the RSPB (Royal Society for the Protection of Birds) on a creative project. It has involved them in lots of outdoor learning visiting places such as Letham Woods, Bo'ness mudflats, Skinflats RSPB Reserve and the Forth Foreshore at Airth

The children have developed lots of skills and have made bird feeders and bird boxes for sparrows and blue tits. By using screws, hammers and tacs they developed woodwork and joinery skills that they will use in the future as adults. Afterwards, the P7s wrote a carefully illustrated set of instructions for anyone else to follow to make a bird box like theirs. The project has involved the children in using stop animation to produce short films about migration and they have had the experience of presenting and filming short documentary style clips which the RSPB will use as a celebration of their learning.

In February, the children planned and prepared a one hour observation to complete the RSPB Big Schools Bird Watch. The children are able to identify lots of different birds such as bar tailed godwits and dunnocks using their bird identification books which were kindly given to them by the RSPB.

<u>Lewis</u> - "This has been a very enjoyable project and I hope that other children in Airth Primary School get this opportunity too."

<u>Shaun</u> – "The project with the RSPB has definitely made the P7 pupils more interested in birds."

<u>Andrew</u> – "This project has been really fun, going out to different parts of our local countryside and filming different types of birds and learning about their habitats."

Primary 4 pupils wrote about the visit to school by Gary hand, Commonwealth Road Cycling hopeful.

On Friday 21st February 2014, a cyclist called Gary Hand came in and spoke to us about the cycling he does.



He showed us

some photos of his cycling team and when he won a gold medal. He told us that he started cycling when he was just 8 years old and has now been cycling for 23 years. He sometimes trains for 1 hour but his maximum amount is 3 hours and he said that it feels really quick. He normally sleeps for nine hours after cycling and the furthest distance he has cycled is 140 miles, he was on his bike for 8-9 hours!

Garry said that he had raced in about 11 or 12 countries and had only won 1 gold medal. After a cycling race he walks very slowly and he hunches his back over. His legs go really wobbly and floppy so as soon as he gets home, he dives straight into bed!

He has a really, really, really, really healthy meal and he always eats fruit and vegetables. He probably has a little treat about 3 times a month. He can cycle with no hands really easily and that really makes me jealous!

Garry has a few different bikes -

- ★ The summer bike-which is really light
- ★ The training bike-which he uses for training
- ★ The race bike-this is the most valuable bike and it costs about £7,000

He gets his bikes for free from his sponsors! He cycles up and down and all around the hills that are near his house for exercise and strength. He is aiming for a gold medal this year and is cycling in the Glasgow Commonwealth Games. We enjoyed the visit loads.

We have been taking part in the Grangemouth Science festival in the month of March.



Our P7 pupils participated in the David Livingstone K-Nex Challenge. They had to design a hut for David Livingstone to live in and meet the criteria set ★ P3 - Ruari, Katie. out in the design brief. Rachael, Morgan,

Michael and Liam made it through to the finals to be held at the Falkirk Wheel.

Jon from Think Science came to deliver his Science is Magic show to P1-7 pupils. The show featured exciting, interactive and inspirational science looking at electricity, gases and forces. The children saw 100,000 volts crackling through the air! They discovered how is it possible to survive lying on 1000 sharp nails? And wondered why has the science man got a silly voice? An inspiring and exciting experience. The sense of awe and wonderment was felt during each performance by staff and pupils.

Following on from the Think Science shows, the teachers were inspired to take part in 'Love science'. This challenge consists of 50 experiments, investigations and research tasks for you to work through until the end of the Science Festival.

The Beavers are back in Scotland! The Scottish Wildlife Trust, in partnership with the Royal Zoological Society of Scotland and Forestry Commission Scotland, released the first beavers to live in Scotland in over 400 years in May 2009. This marks the first formal reintroduction of a native mammal species in the UK. P3/4 and P4 will be finding out more in workshops in school.

P3's and P4's will be learning about SHAPE with a difference. This workshop develops confidence in working with 2D and 3D SHAPE. pupils will be working collaboratively when investigating a particular aspect of geometry and using a variety of



resources in these exciting workshops.

- ★ Learn about rights and responsibilities (needs and wants, making informed decisions)
- ★ Develop their critical thinking (asking questions, listening to others with respect, expressing opinions, justifying reasons)

This storyline has been adapted for First and Second Level. The Second Level explores stereotypes - racism, immigration and xenophobia through an additional dilemma of a whole community

of giants coming to live in the village.

Pupils and teachers alike have enjoyed exploring global issues through the storyline methodology.

<u>'Base' Activities</u>: Our 'Base' at Ladeside supports 25 children with social and communication difficulties/autism. In addition to weekly swimming lessons, getting out into the local community and farther afield is a priority which includes being as active as possible. According to individual needs, our Base children participate in school events, daily walks, horse-riding at 'Riding for the Disabled' in Bannockburn, Boccia, golf, athletics and multi-sports.

We are grateful to local businesses and to friends of the school for donations which allow us to provide extra experiences for our children. Most recently, we have purchased some new bicycles which our Base children can't wait to try out in the school grounds!

Skipathon: Ladeside is a 'skipping school'! Our Young Leaders in P6 have worked hard with Lisa from Active Schools, and with Mrs. Sommerville (PT), to develop their skipping skills and are now passing on their knowledge to other classes. During the month of March, families and friends will be invited into school to see these skills and to sponsor their children. Funds raised will go towards the purchase of our 'outdoor' classroom.

What else do we do to keep fit?

1. INTRODUCTION

1.1 On 8 March 2011 Members were notified of the appointment of Sector as Treasury Management Advisers to Falkirk Council. Sector subsequently changed its name to Capita Asset Services during 2013.

1.2 The contract was for an initial period of 1 year from 1 October 2011 to 30 September 2012, with extensions up to 31 March 2014. The value of the initial contract and extensions to 31 March 2014 was £42,500. The projected expenditure for a further 1 year extension to 31 March 2015 is £17,500.

2. CURRENT SUPPLIERS

2.1 Capita Asset Services has delivered a good service since the beginning of this contract on 1 October 2011 and has provided value for money in a high value area of Finance's activity.

3. EXTENSION OF CONTRACT

- 3.1 The extension of this contract will result in projected expenditure of £17,500 from 1 April 2014 to 31 March 2015. This will bring the total expenditure over the full term of the contract to £60,000 which will remain within anticipated value of the contract and is considered best value for the Council.
- 3.2 The funding for this project is contained within the Treasury Management budget within Finance.

4. **RECOMMENDATION**

4.1 In accordance with Standing order 6.2(i) I extended the contract with Capita Asset Services in the sum of approximately £17,500, for the Provision of Treasury Management Services to Falkirk Council from 1 April 2014 to 31 March 2015.

1. INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 In the Information Bulletin dated 6 March 2013, Members were advised of the purchase of Barrachd Absence Management System at a cost of £66,331.62 for a 3 year period. This cost included 10 development days to implement the system and develop a dashboard and specific reports relevant to Falkirk Council which, in turn, would deliver efficiency savings by streamlining the labour intensive report preparation and distribution process relating to absence management. In turn it provides timely management information to all managers to assist them in their job.
- 1.2 Pilot users across all Services were invited to test the system and make recommendations for improvement. Feedback from these users was overwhelmingly positive and resulted in a number of requests for developmental improvements and additions to the system requiring the procurement of additional system development days

2. PROCUREMENT OF ADDITIONAL CONSULTANCY DAYS

2.1 To deliver the improvements identified requires the purchase of an additional 16 development days. The contract with Barrachd specified that additional development work will be charged at £850 per day which is the same rate as the 10 development days included within the original contract. Barrachd provided a quote for the delivery of the 16 days ie. 16 days @ £850 per day = £13,600. It was noted, however, that as the system is rolled out to other users and additional efficiency potential identified, there may be the requirement to purchase further services from Barrachd. The rate of £850 per day is in line with current market rates for this type of service and it is considered that this quotation provides best value.

3. ACTION TAKEN

3.1 Members note that in accordance with Standing Order 6.2(I) I have accepted the quotation from Barrachd to provide the 16 additional development days from Barrachd @ £850 per day plus any additional development days which may be required in the future to maximise the system potential, up to a maximum value of £100k.
