A frieze was created by the children in each class during their Global Citizenship Storyline, including their family home and other key features of a mountain village. Each child decided on a role within the farm and created a profile of their villager in the farming community.

Each class looked at crops and things that grow in the ground and with the help of discussion and activities they created a new crop. We had some wonderful ideas and our final four crops were the Super Berry Tree, The chocolate tomatoes, the Kindness Berries and. We learned all about the processes and stages involved in growing, harvesting and selling it.

We visited Tesco for a 'Farm to Fork' workshop and children got hands on experience of where their food came from and the different ways our food is used. We also enjoyed a trip to the Milk Barn and their Diary Farm. We looked at the cows and found out how the farm worked. We really enjoyed tasting the Ice Cream after all our learning experiences. The RHET also worked with us to deliver a class talk about sheep farming and cattle

farming. These learning experiences combined with the storyline approach at early level, allowed the children 'real life' learning experiences with a positive impact

The children then shared their learning with parents and guests who came along to their open afternoon. We showcased our crop and set up market stalls for children to talk about their crop and what made it so special. Along with having examples of the activities the children have experienced throughout the topic. The storyline approach has allowed for interdisciplinary work with a combination of the drama, social studies, science/HWB and literacy seems particularly engaging for pupils when taught through the storyline approach. We had a great time learning all about our topic and the comments received from parents and were all very positive!





Wallacestone P5 Library Project

Primary five pupils have been working on a library enterprise project, providing them with a range of interdisciplinary learning experiences, to transform their "quiet room" into a calming and inspiring place to relax and read. The project, which has been wholly led by the pupils, has incorporated learning across a variety of curricular areas, while providing opportunities for pupils to transfer and apply their knowledge and skills learned in class during a real life scenario.

Some of the skills that the children have developed are the use of online sources to identify items to be purchased, whilst





comparing costs and managing money within a budget.

They have learned how to develop and communicate their ideas, demonstrating imagination and presenting solutions to a design brief. By contributing their views, time and talents, they have participated in bringing about a positive change in their school, also gaining support and encouragement from their peers.

This project has culminated in the children planning an event, a grand opening of the library that they have designed and developed involving their parents, special guests and the wider school.

Work Placement News

Work Placements are now becoming more flexible to meet the needs of both young people and employers.

The Commission for Developing Scotland's Young Workforce was established by the Scottish Government in January 2013. Independent of Government, it was tasked with bringing forward a range of recommendations designed to improve young people's transition into employment.

39 Recommendations were made and Recommendation 3 below relates to work experience.

'Recommendation 3: A modern standard should be established for the acceptable content and quality of work experience, and guidelines should be made available to employers. This should be developed by Education Scotland in partnership with employer bodies and Skills Development Scotland. This should involve input from young people. Work experience should feature in the Senior Phase Benchmarking Tool and in Education Scotland school inspections.'

The commission also said that:

'The current approach to work experience needs to be developed to allow young people to have a richer experience of the workplace. For those young people who have already formed a clear set of career aspirations, a meaningful exposure to the requirements of their chosen field related to their studies will better prepare them for success. For those who are less certain about their future career, a range of experiences will help provide them with a good basis on which to make decisions.'



Last year, with involvement from every secondary school, we developed new policy and procedures to accommodate a more flexible approach to work placements and most of our secondary schools have already adopted this. Young people can therefore experience placements any time during their senior phase (S4 – S6) and can now vary in length from the traditional 1 week placement to an extended placement of maybe 2 or 3 afternoons/days per week for a whole term.

Lorraine Hamilton, Work Experience Administrator and Health & Safety Assessor, was at a national network meeting recently where Education Scotland support officers outlined the 1st draft of what is likely to be in the new standard for "Work Placements". They were keen for us to share this with key staff in schools, samples of young people and selected employers for comment. These comments were collated and passed on to Education Scotland, and they are now looking for us to work with their team to further develop the standard and the toolkit that will be used. The completed documents will become part of the final draft of the national work placement standard due for release later in the year and will also feature on the Developing Young Workforce section of the Education Scotland website. Lorraine is looking forward to sharing that with colleagues in schools - some of whom have already been involved and given their feedback.



This is an exciting piece of work that both Steve Dougan,
Opportunities for All Co-ordinator, and Lorraine Hamilton are looking
forward to rolling out across Falkirk schools.

In total, during session 2013-14, 1,058 work placements took place and 493 companies supported these placements.

1+2 Languages - When does this all start? The time is now.....

As we move towards the 1+2 Languages implementation date of 2020, by which time all children in P1 to P7 must be learning a second language in addition to their educating language, it's great to report that a number of exciting things are already happening in Falkirk Council schools.

Laura is an experienced Modern Languages teacher in Graeme HS, who, in addition to her regular teaching commitment, is supporting the development of 1+2 Languages across the authority.

On Friday, 13 March, Laura and her DHT colleague, Kristy Rennie, ably

represented Graeme cluster and Falkirk Council by making a presentation about effective cluster working to senior leaders from across Scotland at a conference hosted by Scottish Government and the Association of Directors of Education (ADES).

What are we doing in Falkirk Council?

Falkirk Council is working in partnership with Stirling/Clackmannanshire Councils to develop language learning. Fiona Moffat, Development Officer for 1+2 Languages, has developed a language learning programme (Foreign Language as a Medium for Education - FLAME) that is now being offered to Falkirk Council teachers. The FLAME approach involves embedding the foreign language into the daily life of the classroom and weaving language through contexts for learning. So

far this Session, there have been five opportunities for Falkirk teachers to undertake this programme in French, and the Spanish version of the



programme is now running too.

A number of colleagues are currently undertaking training, to enable them to become FLAME trainers- this will provide us with a pool of staff who will be able to provide support for school-based

It's been good to welcome back Katrina Lucas, Development Officer for Scots Language with Education Scotland. Katrina is an experienced teacher from Comely Park PS who is currently on secondment, and who is working with a number of local authorities around Scotland.



The series of events that Katrina has been leading in Camelon Education Centre has been enjoyed by the participants. Very positive feedback from the group explains the way in which those teachers are now using their knowledge and skills with pupils. The series will culminate on 29 April, when course participants will share their learning. We are anticipating a visit from Dr. Alasdair Allan, Minister for Learning, Science and Scotland's Languages, at that event. The teachers will have an opportunity to discuss with Dr. Allan a range of issues relating to Scots Language in schools. Dr. Allan will also visit Nethermains PS on 25th March, for a celebration of the use of Scots Language in schools.

1+2 Languages - When does this all start? The time is now.....

This year's Gaelic Language in the Primary School (GLPS) programme of full-day sessions has come to an end for session 2014-15, and Falkirk's cohort of teachers from Bainsford, Kinnaird, Larbert Village and St. Francis Primary Schools will complete the programme by participating in a week-long immersion programme at the Gaelic College on Skye during the Summer holidays.


A meeting to explain the philosophy behind the FLAME approach was offered to Headteachers, prior to the programmes starting in September, 2014.

Progress with our Teaching for Deep Learning Programme

Our Falkirk Teaching for Deep Learning programme (TfDL) continues to develop as a powerful tool for moving Falkirk schools from good to great. Yvonne McBlain, is accountable for its implementation and ongoing management supported by a strong mobilisation team consisting of: Susan Dyer, head teacher at Bankier PS; Jane Jackson, support teacher for outdoor learning; lain Farrington, class teacher at Antonine PS; Charlaine Simpson, principal teacher at Grangemouth HS, and Lynda McDonald, depute head teacher at Moray PS.

Teachers from establishments across the authority elected to use a significant proportion of their own professional learning time to be trained as facilitators for the programme. This training is now in its second year, and there are 30 facilitators operating in 23 schools.

All facilitators were asked to link their facilitation work to their school improvement priorities, and to the professional learning needs expressed by colleagues. This model of professional learning builds on earlier Tapestry TLC initiatives by providing new content for teacher learning communities and encouraging peer observation practices. It has added to our authority menu of professional learning opportunities - particularly developing distributed leadership, teacher autonomy and creative and flexible use of the programme to make a real difference to everyday classroom practice. The mobilisation team and facilitators will make every effort to ensure that the programme continues to impact on teaching and learning in our schools and help us fulfil multiple recommendations from Teaching Scotland's Future.

Facts and Impact Evidenced to date:

- All facilitators reported significant positive impact on their work and their learning through participating in the training programme
- √ Teacher feedback for their facilitators and programme content has been almost exclusively positive so far.
- Some "voluntary" TLCs have formed and use the programme as part of their self-directed professional learning.
- ✓ Some schools were supported in recruiting and training their own set of facilitators. These included: Falkirk HS, Larbert HS, Bo'ness Academy, Denny HS (for literacy), Carron PS, and Carmuirs PS.

✓ By June 2014, 29 schools had accessed one or more sessions, 17 facilitators had delivered 30 TfDL sessions & 9 TfDL training meetings took place.



The average evaluation ratings for these sessions were as follows:

- ★ Overall Rating 3.1 out of 4
- ★ Level of knowledge prior to the session 3.1 out of 6
- ★ Level of knowledge after the sessions 4.4 out of 6
- ★ Rating for training and info sessions 3.6 out of 4
- ★ Level of knowledge prior to training and info session 3.4 out of 6
- ★ Level of knowledge after training and info session – 5.0 out of 6

Qualitative evaluation also leads to the conclusion that the programme and our implementation methods have contributed to a wider ethos of focused, semi-structured professional collaboration opportunities which focus on aspects of pedagogy identified through a symbiosis of school improvement agenda and teacher self-evaluation and choice. This was evidenced at a recent numeracy network meeting where staff cited their TLCs as central (and embedded) methods to develop their teaching and learning in their schools.

Session 2014-15 has also seen the introduction of centrally delivered sessions within the programme. This ensures that practitioners from any Falkirk

establishment (even if they have no TLC in their own school), can engage with the programme if they want to.

Sessions 1, 2 & 3 were very positively evaluated by participants. Session 1 was attended by 6 people, session 2 by 16 people, and session 3 by 21 people. Yvonne McBlain will deliver these sessions supported by cohort 1 facilitator colleagues, in order to develop a sustainable ongoing method of delivery for the service in the future. This adds to the range of distributed leadership and differentiated professional learning opportunities which our authority can offer its practitioners.

NEXT STEPS:

 Review and update the task brief with the mob team to identify how to develop and maintain the programme.

- Continue to develop administration process which ensures effective evaluation of the programme as part of our ERD processes.
- Support establishments in "bespoking" the programme where required
- Promote awareness of how the programme fits with other professional learning across our service

Above all though, our mission is to raise awareness of how the Teaching for Deep Learning programme can help teachers improve their practice in order to raise attainment and achievement for pupils across our authority.

Slow as you Glow!

The new version of Glow launched back in October. And very quietly, slowly but surely, in the following months half of Falkirk's high schools and primary schools have already, at their request, had all class or subject sites set up.

establishments (and primary and secondary schools) have been exploring the uses of the choice of video-conferencing tools to connect learners with others outwith their own centre are already 38 authority-wide resource &

Staff using this new version of Glow have commented on the huge improvements in this version – unlimited storage space for every user, live real-time editing facility for Word, Powerpoint or Excel documents online, multiple uploads of documents, enormous email capacity, video-conferencing tool choices, newsfeed messaging, ease of resetting passwords for a whole class (and facility for setting a recovery email address when we forget our password!!) and a range of apps for mobile devices.

Pupils have found Office 365 tools in the new version of Glow to be very easy to use – even squeals of excitement when collaborating on a Word Online document at the same time as others in the class! Four of Falkirk's primary schools (Nethermains, St Bernadette's, Ladeside and Bankier) used Word Online as part of a national collaborative book started off by two of Scottish children's authors – everyone taking part watching the story unfold before their eyes from classrooms around the country, as they too contributed. Some teachers in Braes, St Mungo's and Graeme high schools have been exploring the use of OneNote Class Notebook Creator – one of the tools available via Glow.

And likewise a number of staff in a few early years

establishments (and primary and secondary schools) have been exploring the uses of the choice of video-conferencing tools to connect learners with others outwith their own centre. There are already 38 authority-wide resource & information sharing sites created for dissemination of resources to all Falkirk Council Education Services staff to support learning and teaching. Several schools have been provided with in-school staff development for all staff on the use of Glow. Support has been provided to many staff



individually to help them use specific tools in Glow such as video-conferencing with the new Lync or Adobe Connect, OneNote or OneNote Class Notebook Creator and the new version of Wordpress blogs.





Wednesday 3rd March
