Review of Integration Scheme (first stage consultation)

For Consideration and Comment

1. Executive Summary

1.1 This report provides an update on progress on the review of the integration scheme, in line with the Public Bodies (Joint Working) (Scotland) Act 2014 (the 2014 Act), following on from the last report to the Board on 4 June 2021.

2. Recommendations

The Integration Joint Board is asked to consider and comment on:

2.1 the contents of this report.

3. Background

3.1 Work has commenced on the review of the integration scheme. At its last meeting, the IJB agreed to the first stage consultation on the review of the scheme, in line with the 2014 Act. Three main areas were suggested for review:

Governance

the Council seeks an increase in the number of voting members from 3 to 4.

- Operational delivery arrangements and the role of the Chief Officer the aim is to better describe the position in the scheme and reflect progress made in this area.
- Finance

the focus in this section will be on risk sharing but the opportunity will also be taken to provide more clarity in this section generally.

4. Outcome of first stage consultation and next steps

4.1 The first stage consultation ran from 15 to 30 June 2021 and was conducted by way of an online survey issued to statutory consultees under the 2014 Act. There were 12 responses.

- 4.2 Eight of the responses agreed that the 3 proposed areas for review were suitable, with 2 responses having no view, and 2 disagreeing. A summary of responses/comments is appended to this report for information.
- 4.3 In view of the broad agreement on the areas for review, focus will remain on the 3 main areas identified (with the opportunity for some general "tidying up" for example, a valid point was raised in the consultation about updating the complaints and information sharing sections to reflect current legislation).
- 4.4 Once the scheme has been reviewed, it will be presented to the Council and the Health Board for approval. Before submission to the Scottish Ministers for final approval, there will be a second stage consultation with the statutory consultees, in line with the 2014 Act.
- 4.5 This may give rise to consequential changes in the Board's standing orders in relation to the membership of the Board arising from discussions pursued within the scheme review. In particular, there is consensus that it is not necessary to retain the Council and Health Board chief executives as members.

5. Conclusions

5.1 The review of the scheme offers an opportunity to clarity the roles and responsibilities of the constituent authorities, the operation of the Board, and the partnership more generally. Consultation is an important part of the review.

Resource Implications

There are none beyond the requirement for officer time in conducting the review.

Impact on IJB Outcomes and Priorities

It is important that the scheme provides a sound framework to allow the Board to deliver on its outcomes and priorities.

Consultation

Second stage consultation will be undertaken on the updated draft scheme, in line with the 2014 Act.


Falkirk Health and Social Care Partnership – Review of Integration Scheme

We need to increase access to Injection Equipment Provision to ensure that the government target to eliminate Hepatitis C is met.

We have very poor and expensive public transport in these areas and more should be done if we are to tackle the growing menace of drug deaths impacting our communities.
