Title: Enhanced Concessionary Sport, Leisure and Cultural

1. Purpose of Report

- 1.1 The purpose of this report is to provide the Executive with recommendations to enhance the current Concessionary Card scheme for Leisure and Cultural services: the Go Card scheme.
- 1.2 This report aligns with the 2022/27 Council Plan by demonstrating the Council's commitment to the priorities of:
 - (1) Supporting Stronger and Healthier communities;
 - (2) Promoting opportunities and educational attainment and reducing inequalities.

2. Recommendations

2.1 It is recommended that Executive:

- (i) note the work undertaken to align the eligibility criteria of the existing GoCard scheme with the Council's Concessions and Charges Policy;
- (ii) note the intention to launch a new scheme, to be called GoCard PLUS;
- (iii) agree to the benefits listed in paragraph 6.4 below being adopted;
- (iv) agree to allocate an initial £75,000 in 2023/24 to support this expanded scheme, with the Director of Children's Services to review this provision annually thereafter.
- (v) note that all existing benefits of the GoCard scheme are to be retained.

3. Climate Change Implications

3.1 The recommendations of this report do not give rise to any material implications for the Council's climate change targets and obligations. Officers' assessment is that the changes detailed in this report will not lead to changes in service provision or the deployment of resources that would increase or decrease the emission of carbon.

4. Background

- 4.1 The GoCard is a concessionary card which can be used throughout our leisure and culture facilities for free or discounted access to a range of services and activities.
- 4.2 As part of the Tackling Poverty in Falkirk report presented to the Executive on 21 June 2022, the following changes were agreed to the existing GoCard scheme:
 - GoCard membership eligibility be extended to include anyone in receipt of an income related benefit, bringing this in line with the Council's Charges and Concessions Policy.
 - a. Implemented on 1 October 2022.
 - (2) The benefits of the card be temporarily amended to include free access to casual swimming, for the card holder and their children, until 31 March 2023.
 - a. Implemented on 1 September 2022 (now extended for an additional 6 months).
- 4.3 It was recognised that the GoCard offers considerable support to people living on a low income, as well as benefitting Physical and Mental Health and Wellbeing.
- 4.4 Officers were asked to consider further options to enhance the existing scheme or propose a suitable replacement.
- 4.5 This work was undertaken in line with the wider annual pricing review across Sport and Leisure services.

5. Considerations

- 5.1 The Council Plan states that the Council will:
 - (1) help people participate in activities that improve Health & Wellbeing in a place that is appropriate for them with particular focus on inclusivity and those who experience barriers to participation such as poverty, inequality, and disability;
 - (2) support care experienced children and young people to live and learn in their community.
- 5.2 The existing GoCard scheme was benchmarked against comparable schemes within our 'Family group' of Councils as designated by the Local Government Benchmarking Framework (Culture and Leisure Services).

Given the vast range of services and membership types on offer across each local authority, we used the percentage discount offered against Health and Fitness membership and the number of eligible groups for this discount as an indicative comparator.

The table below lists the percentage discount and the number of eligible groups, broken down by local authority. This shows that the concessionary scheme offered by Falkirk Council currently benchmarks favourably against our comparable local authorities.

- 5.3 A significant piece of work is undertaken annually within the service to review all prices within Culture and Leisure services, taking into consideration current prices against competitors, both private and public. Local and national benchmarking¹ is also conducted along with the prevailing wider economic climate.
- 5.4 Consultation with the Falkirk Champions Board and colleagues from the Fairer Falkirk team has repeatedly highlighted the importance of being able to access our Sport and Leisure services. While there isn't enough data nationally to measure activity levels of care experienced young people, we know from the lived experience of these young people that they often feel excluded and less able to participate in sport and physical activity, with cost being highlighted as a significant barrier to participation.
- 5.5 There is a wealth of research nationally which demonstrates that people from the most deprived areas are less active, with people living in the most deprived 20% of our communities being least likely to meet the recommended daily activity levels or to participate in sport or physical activity. This leads to poorer mental health outcomes and long-term health conditions associated with inactivity.²

6. Proposals on the Way Forward

6.1 Considering the ongoing cost of living crisis, it was decided that now was not the correct time to remove or reduce any elements of the existing benefits of the GoCard as this would effectively introduce a price increase for our lowest income households at a time when they can least afford this.

We aimed to provide a concessionary leisure membership scheme that considered the needs of our communities; providing support to those living in poverty, our care experienced children and young people and asylum seekers housed in the authority. We have taken steps to not only retain but enhance the range of benefits available to members and a replacement scheme, to be known as GoCard PLUS, will be created.

We have also made recommendations that support a Whole Family Approach. Specifically, by ensuring the GoCard PLUS included a more family centred range of benefits by removing or reducing barriers to participation and providing access to core life skills for children and tackling inequality.

Given the financial challenges faced by the Council, we have taken steps to ensure any new benefits are directed specifically towards the communities and groups identified as a priority in the Council Plan.

- 6.2 An overview of the proposed benefits to GoCard PLUS membership is listed below:
 - a. All care experienced young people living in Falkirk be eligible for free GoCard PLUS membership including full health and fitness membership.
 - b. Asylum seekers living in Falkirk are provided with free GoCard PLUS membership.
 - c. The current temporary offer of free casual swimming for GoCard members is retained as an ongoing benefit for GoCard PLUS members.
 - d. Free places are allocated within Falkirk Council's Sports Development Programmes to the children of GoCard PLUS members.
 - e. Free sessions are provided within the Active Forth Programme for GoCard PLUS members.

6.3 The table below lists the key changes we are recommending to the concessionary membership scheme.

^{***}Full Time students <u>under the age of 25</u> will qualify for the new Fitness Unlimited Young Adult Health and Fitness membership. At a cost of £22 per month this delivers a further monthly saving of £2.10 per month.

6.5 Communication and Promotion

The scheme will be re-launched as the GoCard PLUS, which will replace the current GoCard scheme. This will be done in partnership with the Council's Communications and Marketing team, the aim of which will be to further raise the profile of the scheme and achieve a wide circulation of the benefits associated with it. This will include website and social media outlets as well as information provided within specific Council venues. We will develop closer working relationships with our colleagues across the Council, particularly those that work closely with the target groups. Libraries are identified as a key service to enhance the reach of the scheme to those who will benefit most from the enhanced scheme.

7. Implications

Financial

7.1 If the recommendations at 2.1 are agreed, costs are anticipated to be approximately £75,000 for 2023/24.

Finance for this will come from the carry forward from 22/23 concessionary card scheme to fund 2023/24. However, additional funds will be required to enable the scheme to continue beyond this financial year.

The uptake and cost of these changes would be carefully monitored. Officers will then assess the usage and make provision for ongoing funsing from within existing budgets.

Resources

7.2 It is anticipated that there will be no implications on Sport and Leisure staff as a result of adopting these changes, with Officers incorporating this into their existing work plans.

Legal

7.3 There are no legal considerations or implications in agreeing this proposal.

Equalities

7.4 A full Equality and Poverty Impact Assessment (EPIA) has been completed in relation to this proposal. The EPIA is available in Appendix 1.

The assessment showed a positive impact on Age, Disability, Poverty & Care Experienced Young People and Asylum Seekers.

8 Conclusions

8.1 The current concessionary membership scheme provides valuable support and reduces the barriers faced by a significant number of eligible Falkirk residents.

We have identified a series of cost-effective enhancements to the scheme which, if agreed, will be relaunched under the new name GoCard Plus.

Use of the additional benefits of GoCard Plus will significantly improve the support available to families living in poverty; care experienced young people; asylum seekers; and those living with long-term health conditions.

It details further work to fully implement our approach to tackling poverty and support people with increasing living costs. This shows our continued commitment to supporting those in greatest need.

Through previous engagement from Care Experienced Young People we know that gaining access to Sport and Leisure facilities is regularly raised as a barrier to their participation. Which in turn can negatively impact their physical and mental wellbeing. Addressing this specific inequality has been a longstanding aim of the service. There is a wealth of evidence nationally and internationally around the links between poverty and the long term impacts of physical and mental health. Considering this it was decided that removing groups of people who were eligible for the GoCard currently would adversely impact them, both in the short and longer term.
