Our new assessment and evidence based approaches to setting targets based on pupils development needs have been successful in giving the team working for the child a clearer understanding of the individual child's needs and effective strategies to support them.

In a recent survey about Outreach, all respondents stated that the outreach support they received this session has a had a good or excellent impact on relation ships within the school and pupil's ability to sustain their mainstream placement.




Comely Park Goes Extra Eco! Earth Hour!

A FRUITFUL LESSON AT CALIFORNIA PRIMARY

Pupils can expect to be harvesting the fruits of their labours from next year onwards with an exciting sustainability project to establish small orchards at 10 primary schools.

In January this year pupils, with the help of parent & grandparent volunteers, planted ten fruit trees

and five fruit bushes - eating and cooking apples, pear, plum, blackcurrant, blueberry and bramble, including some Scottish varieties.

The project will involve the children learning about the history of orchards in the Forth Valley area, local fruit varieties, cultivation and pruning, how to use the fruit and its health benefits.

The primary schools taking part are Kinneil, Oxgang, Denny, Carronshore, Antonine, St Andrew's, Bantaskin, St Margaret's, California and Whitecross.



River Carron Regeneration Project – Phase 1 (2011)

The River Carron Regeneration Project will begin in June 2011 after Communities Along the Carron Association (CATCA) secured £57k to enable the first phase of the river clean between Fankerton to Larbert Viaduct to begin.

This iconic and historical environmental river regeneration project has received invaluable technical / engineering and environmental expertise from the River Carron Fisheries Management Group.

The project will be conducted in two phases – Fankerton to Larbert in 2011, and Larbert to Grangemouth in 2012. It will benefit all 16 communities along the river from Carron Valley to Grangemouth. It is an environmental, wildlife conservation, biodiversity project and brings many public, social and economic benefits to the area.

The majority of the funding to enable this work to proceed was secured from Falkirk Environment Trust (FET) with additional funding received from Falkirk Council, The River Carron Fisheries Management Group (RCFMG), Callander Estate Trustees and CATCA.

FCE Consultants have been appointed Project Manager and Walker Landscapes have been awarded the contract to professionally clean up the river and Creative Management Solutions carried out the land-owners consents work.

The project will cover the entire river system (including its tributaries) and will include the assistance of voluntary litter picking groups working in conjunction with Falkirk Council's Litter Strategy Team.

By removing industrial, commercial, social and domestic waste from the river system, there will be an immediate improvement on pollution and water quality. The visual impact for local communities will also be noticeable. The project will hopefully increase public environmental awareness and respect for the river. In addition, Log Jams in certain tributaries will be removed to allow Atlantic Salmon and Sea Trout to migrate into spawning areas that are currently unavailable due to these blockages.





St Patrick's Flies the Flag for their 150th Anniversary

Big Writing

Big Writing has been very successful in all classes. Pupil s and staff completed a questionnaire. The feedback was very positive with 100% of pupils agreeing that Big Writing has improved their understanding of the writing process and has enhanced their knowledge of grammar using VCOP.

Parental involvement

Along with the annual Meet the Teacher Evening and Reporting to Parents evenings this session, all classes have been encouraged to invite parents into classes to share in their child's learning experiences across a variety of topics. This has been very successful with a majority of parents attending. School class assemblies have also been very well attended. Parents joined us during our "Shake up Wake Breakfast Week" by coming in for coffee and croissants after taking part in a Walk to School event.

Everyone enjoyed their healthy breakfast day thanks to all the helpers who served breakfast each morning.

End of Session Glow Update



In November we had a week when we raised the profile of this issue. There was an assembly at




the end of the week where the children played an active part and really thought about the meaning and effect of bullying. Photos were taken of the

We hope to involve Canon Leo in our Assemblies, with a focus on The Missions, Charity and Global awareness and have our second RRS Steering Group meeting. We will be recording the childrens' views on what is happening in school also.

Use of portable/removable devices - Guidance for Staff

Threats to Information Security are becoming more widespread, ambitious and increasingly sophisticated. In the light of this, ICT Corporate Services has produced an Information Security Policy to provide the guidelines and framework for ensuring that the confidentiality, security and integrity of information held by the Council is maintained. The full policy document will be found on the Council's Intranet. In response to this development Education Services has produced this guidance on appropriate use of portable/removable devices which may require changes in current practice.

It can be common practice to move information or files from school/work to home either on a laptop or on removable media such as a USB pen. In the light of the new council policy, you will need to consider carefully security issues including retaining the safe possession of the equipment itself, the possibility of exposing the equipment to viruses and the security of the information content contained on it.

Information content can include: text, images, audio files, email or anything else which can be held in electronic form.

Portable/Removable devices includes:

- · USB pen drives, memory sticks, FlashDrives etc.
- CDs / DVDs.
- External Hard disks.
- Flash memory cards including SD cards, memory sticks and compact flash.
- Laptops
- Any other medium, equipment or device capable of holding / transferring material in a computer readable format.

Within the context of education, the presumption is made that there is a distinction between data that is of a curricular nature (e.g. worksheets) and that which contains personal data (e.g. pupils' personal information, test results, etc.) Any data which is personal information about staff or pupils will need to be held securely on removable media or laptops which are encrypted Encrypted USB Flash Drive

• ICT Corporate Services have identified a hardware encrypted USB Flash Drive and one has been purchased for every education establishment and will be distributed soon. Further drives can be purchased through the ICT Service Desk at an approximate cost of £20 per unit.

Encryption Software for Latops

• For any laptop holding personal data, encryption software must be on it and active. BeCrypt is the software being used by ICT Corporate Services and can be ordered through the ICT Service Desk at an approximate cost of £50 to £55 depending upon the quantity ordered.

Your responsibilities:

- Only use removable media if really necessary and they MUST be capable of holding encrypted data if any type of sensitive data is to be stored on them.
 Better still.
- Do not store personal information on a removable device.
- Do not transfer other people's personal information on to removable media without their consent.
- A virus check must be the first task performed after inserting a removable device into a computer and **before** opening any information held on the device.
- Mention any concerns about virus contamination to your ICT Technician/Coordinator who should place a Service Desk call
- If you suspect that a home computer may have a virus, do not connect or link removable media to it which you then intend to bring to work/school.
- Report any loss or theft of removable media to your line manager/ICT Coordinator.

Education Services Welcomes Community Learning and Development

Education Services has recently welcomed the Community Learning and Development Service (CLD) into the fold. Community Learning and Development Service (CLD) joins Education Service against a backdrop of massive inequality in income, and as a result spending power, significant cuts to public sector spending, rising unemployment, the increasing costs of living and ever rising financial barriers to social progression and development.

Investment in community learning and development can be one of the best means of combating poverty, improving overall health, and eliminating social exclusion. Although learning often takes place within formal settings, a great deal of valuable learning also takes place either deliberately or informally in everyday life. It is the learning that the CLD Service facilitates with children, young people, adults and communities.

In these very challenging times we have more reason to continue with and expand our positive policies and programmes, such as Curriculum for Excellence, Early Years Framework and Getting it Right for Every Child (GIRFEC), 16+ Activity Agreements, More Choices, More Chances (MCMC), the Skills for Scotland Strategy, Community Empowerment Action Plan and local community planning.

This means that we should be embedding community learning and development opportunities for

children, young people, adults and communities and giving them maximum exposure to activities that are positive, exciting, progressive and relevant to them. Learning is and should be a transformational experience for those "learners" involved with the CLD Service.

Since the CLD Service transferred to Education Services, many "new" colleagues have asked "What does CLD do and how can we work together?" The first question can sometimes be difficult to explain, but here goes.

CLD Service seeks to address the learning needs of the Falkirk Council area through partnership. It uses the strengths of institutions, public, private and voluntary services, and community groups to enable children, young people and adults to achieve to their full potential. CLD Service uses learning and development as a way to build community capacity, and to promote social cohesion, social inclusion, regeneration and economic development.

In practical terms, therefore, the CLD Service works with its partners to support learning and development of children, young people, adults and communities across the Council area. The CLD Service has a number of specific delivery objectives:

The Service also has a Support for Learning Communities Team that leads on the delivery literacy, ESOL, BME, Falkirk Young Scot, Training and Staff Development / CLD upskilling, capacity building support to Youth Organisations (Youth Scotland), Rock The Talk, Duke of Edinburgh Award, Youth Achievement Awards, youth participation and engagement (MSYP's), disability work, international work, targeted employability / core skills delivery, marketing and publicity.

The Services' local community planning function is taken forward by two Local Community Planning Officers who are based at Sealock House, along with the CLD Manager.

This flag had been flown over the Capitol Building and it is huge - 10ft by 8ft! It was presented, folded military style, in a triangular wooden case. It was presented by a former pupil who emigrated to Canada, whose husband has connections with a senator and arranged for the flag to be given to St Patrick's.



Sealock House Eco Garden Project

In the summer of 2010 several Education Services teams amalgamated and moved to new premises at Sealock House, Grangemouth, Open Plan Working Sessions were held to give staff an opportunity to suggest ways of improving the working environment. Approximately 100 staff had been moved from various premises and teams to one open plan office where the surrounding area was industrial. Many people did not know each other or the role they played within Education Services.

One suggestion was to investigate the possibility of

transforming an outdoor space into an Eco Garden for staff use.

Questionnaires were sent out to gauge the interest in such a project as well as what staff would like in the garden. Subsequently a working party was formed late January 2011 to undertake the task of transforming a piece of land adjoining the office building. that was derelict and full of litter, into an eco garden.

The Working Party enthusiastically set out to organise fundraisers to cover the costs of materials required, seek advice in preparing a design plan and encourage all staff to get behind the project.

Working together on this project has had three main positive effects:

Allowing people to get to know each other really well in a short space of time and improving staff morale which in turn improved working and social relationships.

- Improving the environment by cultivating derelict ground and improving our knowledge of creating a garden from scratch. Project included litter clear up, turf being laid, planting potatoes in old recycling bags, planting flowers, researching reusing wooden pallets to make garden benches and acquiring composters.
- Providing a pleasant environment for staff to enjoy a break and meet with others outwith the office environment.

The project created many team building

opportunities. The sum of 'butty' day, coffee, scones, photo competition, sunflower Greenhorn 'dressed to kill' to name a few.



Plans had to be revised as we went along. The ground was infested by a troublesome weed and the soil was solid clay. We were extremely grateful to Estates Management for advice and their wonderful Modern Apprentices who used our garden as a project and did the majority of the hard manual labour. This allowed us to get the garden into shape for late summer and let staff see something tangible for all the hard work they had put in fundraising.

All that is now left is - LATE SUNSHINE!

City and Guilds Employability and Personal Development Awards

Positive Qualities Ltd are a local training company who work closely with local schools to deliver training to young people from Graeme High, Falkirk High, Grangemouth High and St Mungo's High Schools.

They also deliver WOW Programmes which involve customer service training to the 5* hotel market and prestige car brands - techniques which are included in the training which the young people receive.

Employability and Personal Development is a new qualification which was introduced by City and Guilds in 2008. To date 112 young people have successfully achieved the award.

Heather's Hut Challenge

P6 pupils at Deanburn were awarded first prize in the National Engineering and Science final held in the Glasgow Science Centre in June. Heather's Hut is a renewable energy challenge organised by the Young Engineers and Science Clubs Scotland. It is backed by a variety of companies including Scotland and Tomorrow's Engineers and the Scotlish Council for Development in Industry. Heather is 'Heather the Weather', Meteorologist and former senior forecaster with BBC Scotland.

The children spent a week investigating various forms of renewable energy, culminating in building a model hut that incorporated as many

elements as possible. The finished hut has lights and a door buzzer / burglar alarm powered by a working wind turbine; solar panels providing energy for lighting and a fan; a water turbine; a solar water heater and cooker; and a clock run by lemons!



Support was gratefully received from BP, Bo'ness Academy, Heriott Watt University, BT and Hugh Stewart from Falkirk Council.

Over the week the investigation was filmed and entered into a national competition. Seventy Scottish schools too part and the Deanburn pupils' hut was short listed in the final eleven. It will be showcased at the Science Centre in Glasgow where the pupils will present their project to a panel of judges including Heather the Weather and also to Fergus Ewing, minister for the environment.



Tony Harris, Secretary of the R.C.F.M.G said "The events were a great success for the benefit of the River Carron and everyone who enjoys the river, and I would like to thank everyone who supported the events and for being part of an important chapter of the history of the River Carron and its environment".

The National Spring Clean took place between March 14 and May 16 with nearly 100,000 public-spirited community members – including 76,481 school children – joining in to help clear up litter left

1. **BACKGROUND**

- 1.1 Falkirk Council as a Member of Scotland Excel, the local government centre of expertise for procurement (Excel) has access to a range of national local government framework contracts.
- 1.2 The Director of Corporate and Neighbourhood Services has delegated authority to determine which contracts the Council should procure through Excel and which should be procured directly by the Council.
- 1.3 The purpose of this Bulletin Report is to advise Members of the Council's commitment to participate in an Excel contract for Washroom Solutions.

2. PARTICIPATION AND BENEFITS

Washroom Solutions

- 2.1 The Council, in partnership with Stirling and Clackmannan Councils, has two contracts in place for washroom solutions. The first is for the vending of sanitary products (PHS Ltd based at Caerphilly, Wales) and the second is for collection and disposal (Cannon Hygiene based at Morecambe, England). These two contracting arrangements have now concluded.
- 2.2 Excel has a national framework agreement, see table below, which ends 30th September 2013 with a possible 12 month extension to 30th September 2014.

- 2.3 This framework offers the Council the opportunity to contract with a single provider (Canon Hygiene based at Morecambe). The single provider will offer opportunities to streamline contract management and will also deliver savings of approximately £16,000 per annum.
- 2.4 Considering the benefits and savings to be realised best value would be achieved by Falkirk Council procuring washroom solutions from the Excel Framework from the 1st September 2011.

3. **ACTION TAKEN**

3.1 As best value would be achieved I agreed to Falkirk Council's participation in the Scotland Excel contract for Washroom Solutions from the 1st September 2011 to the 30th September 2013 with an estimated annual expenditure of £36,500.

1. BACKGROUND

1.1 Falkirk Council as a Member of Scotland Excel, the local government centre of expertise for procurement (Excel) has access to a range of national local government framework contracts.

1.2 The Director of Corporate and Neighbourhood Services has delegated authority to determine which contracts the Council should procure through Excel and which should be procured directly by the Council.

2. PARTICIPATION AND BENEFITS

Refuse Containers

2.1 The Council's current Framework Contract, with a number of national providers has ended and the suppliers are noted below:

- 2.3 A benchmarking exercise was conducted with Excel across the range of refuse containers currently purchased. This exercise was to determine what benefits could be realised from formal participation in the national contract for Refuse Containers.
- 2.4 From the pricing information available it is estimated that participation in the Excel contract would secure a saving of approximately 2% per annum across the range of containers purchased. On an estimated annual spend of £120,000 the Council will secure savings of approximately £7,000 over the full term of the Excel contract.
- 2.5 Considering the savings to be realised, best value would be achieved by Falkirk Council procuring refuse containers from the Excel Framework.
- 2.6 The funding for this project is contained within the Waste Management and Waste Strategy Budgets.
- 2.7 In accordance with Standing Order 6.2(ii) relating to contracts, the approval of the Chief Governance Officer to enter into contracts was sought and received.

3. ACTION TAKEN

3.1 As best value would be achieved I agreed to Falkirk Council's participation in the Scotland Excel contract, for Refuse Containers with an estimated annual expenditure of £120,000.

1. INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 A tender for the Provision of a Flail Mowing Service—Rural Highway Verges as part of a Framework Agreement was advertised through the Public Contracts Scotland Portal as an open tender. Subsequently seventeen companies expressed an interest in tendering.
- 1.2 The framework start date is 11th July 2011 and will run for two years until 10th July 2013 with an option to extend for a further 12 months from 11th July 2013 to 10th July 2014.

2. TENDERS RECEIVED

- 2.1 One tender was received by the due date of Monday 20th June 2011 and opened in accordance with Standing Order 11.2 relating to contracts.
- 2.2 Following evaluation, the tender received from George Steel Contract Services in the sum of £30.00 per hour, was considered to offer best value for the Council.
- 2.3 The funding for this project is contained within the Ground Maintenance Miscellaneous Works budget, the budget being approximately £50,000 over the next two financial years.

3. ACTION TAKEN

3.1 In accordance with Standing Order 6.2(i), I accepted the tender submitted by George Steel Contract Services, Falkirk, in the sum of £30.00 per hour in respect of the Provision of a Flail Mowing Service – Rural Highway Verges to Falkirk Council.

1. INTRODUCTION

1.1 The Council currently has in place a contract for the Provision of a Rent Deposit Guarantee Scheme with Edinburgh Cyrenians Trust.

- 1.2 The contract period is from 1st November 2009 to 31st October 2010, with the option of two possible annual extensions.
- 1.3 The estimated value for the contract including both annual extensions is £270,000. The spend for the first year of the contract was £86,400.
- 1.4 The contract was previously extended from 1st November 2010 to 31st October 2011, the estimated value for the 12 month extension was approximately £90,000.
- 1.5 The purpose of this report is to take up a second extension which would commence on 1st November 2011 and expire on 30th April 2012. The estimated value for the six month extension is approximately £48,000.
- 1.6 The current contract anticipates the creation of 43 tenancies for the six months extension. Thus far the Cyrenians have created 122 tenancies since November 2009. It is proposed to extend the contact with the Cyrenians for an additional six months to allow the Council to consider alternative ways of providing assistance to people trying to access accommodation in the private rented market. The major reason for this is the significant reforms to the welfare benefit system which are being implemented from April 2012 - fewer people will qualify for Local Housing Allowance and this has implications for the long term viability of the scheme. In particular, the increase of the age threshold for single people from 25 to 35 years means that there will be an increased number of single people who will be unable to afford a single tenancy on their own and may need to consider the option of sharing accommodation. At present, the contract for the Rent Deposit Guarantee Scheme does not make provision for those who wish to share accommodation. Extending the current contract for the Rent Deposit Guarantee Scheme allows the Council time to assess the best way forward in the light of these new constraints.

2. CONTRACT EXTENSION

- 2.1 It is considered best value for Falkirk Council to extend the contract with Edinburgh Cyrenians for a further six months for the following reasons:
 - a) No need for the Council to incur further tendering or advertising costs.
 - b) Current contract continues to provide best value and spend will remain within budget.
 - c) Current provider is meeting contract performance and quality standards.
- 2.2 The funding for this project is contained within the General Fund Housing Budget.
- 2.3 In accordance with Standing Order 6.2(i) relating to contracts, the approval of the Director of Law and Administration Services to enter into a six months extension of contract with that party was sought and received.

3. ACTION TAKEN

3.1 In accordance with Standing Order 6.2(i), I entered into a six month extension of contract with Edinburgh Cyrenians Trust, with an approximate contract value of £48000 in respect of the Provision of a Rent Deposit Guarantee Scheme to Falkirk Council.
