INTRODUCTION

This Information Bulletin is divided into two parts. Getting It Right For Young Carers In Falkirk

Who are young carers?

A young carer is a person under the age of 18 providing regular care or assistance to a family member, who may have a long term illness, physical or sensory impairment, mental ill health, drugs or alcohol problem, or other condition requiring sustained support. 175,000 young carers were identified in the UK in the 2001 census. However, this may be an underestimation of the true number, as recent surveys have estimated that working towards improving outcomes there may be as many as 700,000 (BBC, 2010). Many of these young people remain hidden and their needs unrecognised. If unsupported, caring can have a significantly negative impact upon a young person in a number of areas of their lives, including school, friendships, and mental health and wellbeing. 27% of young carers are reported to be experiencing educational difficulties (Dearden and Becker, 2004). Attending school, keeping up with course work and concentrating whilst can all be problematic for young carers. For some young carers school is seen as a sanctuary which provides them with time out from the demands they face at home, whereas for others it can add to their pressures other organisations have all been (Scottish Government, 2010).

Young Carers In Falkirk

With the release of Getting It Right For Young Carers: The Young Carers Strategy For Scotland 2010-2015 (Scottish Government, 2010), services throughout Scotland have been considering how best to support these young people. In Falkirk, services have been working jointly

with the Young Carers Project, to improve provision for young carers. Young carers in The Princess Royal Trust the 11-15 year for Carers old age bracket are particularly vulnerable to educational disadvantage, with 35% experiencing difficulties (Dearden and Becker, 2002). For this reason, secondary schools have been and a variety of strategies have been put in place including a young carers week (Falkirk High), awareness raising sessions for staff and students (Graeme High), integration of young carers related topics into the curriculum (Denny High), identification of a young carers champion (Larbert High). Primary schools have also been considering young carers.

As well as education services, other organisations in Falkirk who have contact with children and families have also been focusing upon young carers and looking at ways that they can better support young carers. The police, social work, careers and employment services and a variety of looking at ways that they can work together to support young carers.

Falkirk and Clackmannanshire Young Carers Project

Falkirk and Clackmannanshire Young Carers' Project currently works with approximately 155 young carers in the local area, providing practical and emotional support, enabling young people to have time out from their

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caring role and an opportunity to meet other young carers. Having someone listen to and understand their situation is often what young carers say they most need.

"The Young Carers Project means so much to me and I have met loads of new people and have become involved in many new things. I may not have had the opportunity to do so otherwise. Most importantly people at the project listen to me and understand." (Alexander, 16 years, From The Young Carers Strategy, 2010-2015).

Working Together

barriers to learning and opportunity, with continued effort from organisations throughout Falkirk, we can work together to ensure that young people who are carers, are better supported and therefore more able to cope with the demands of their every-day lives. Sustained efforts in these areas will go a long way towards improving the educational outcomes and wellbeing of young carers in Falkirk.

Here are the characters which have been developed. As you can see, they are quite detailed as we want them to have personalities to be able to interact on Bebo etc, and to develop other storylines about them to appear in school magazines etc.

Eryc – 8 years old (primary 4).


Personality - He is a shy, kind and gentle natured boy. He doesn't have much self confidence.

His interests are: Computers (PS3, Xbox, Nintendo 3Ds), Cartoons. He also likes playing outdoors on his bike or playing football.

Mum, aged 30, has a full time job as a receptionist at a local dental surgery and also works 3 evenings per week in a supermarket.

Older brother is 11 and is in P7 at the same school as Eryc. He has high functioning autism.

School scenario – Eryc's older brother is taunted by some of the children in Eryc's class. The children do not



understand that his big brother has autism; they just think that he is weird. Eryc's older brother ignores the children's taunts. Eryc however, tends to ask the children to stop taunting his brother at which point the children sometimes turn on him and the bullying can turn physical against Eryc.

Trayc - 10year old, Primary 6

Personality – she is very confident and self assured. She can stand up for herself and is very friendly and accepting. She is a very mature 10 year old, with a witty sense of humour.

Interests – Music/Celebs (Katy Perry, Rhianna, Taio Cruz, N-Dubz), Magazines (Now, OK), TV (Hollyoaks, Smash Hits Musical.


Mum, aged 39, has MS, is physically disabled and is in a wheelchair. She often gets depressed with her situation having been physically able up until the age of 37. Her predicament is fairly recent and she drinks heavily from time to time to take the edge off. Trayc's mum has long periods where she can care for herself reasonably well, but from time to time she relapses and might need to go into hospital/need more assistance at home. Trayc helps dress her Mum before she goes to school and bathes her mum before making the evening meal.

School scenario: Trayc is often late for school and doesn't get her homework done very often; her teacher gives her a hard time for this. The school are aware that her mum has MS, but are unaware of all the domestic and caring responsibilities inherent in her domestic situation.

Trayc has a good group of friends at school who are very understanding about her situation.

Coming Soon to a Glow Group near You! An Interdisciplinary Learning Glow Group

Interdisciplinary studies can also take advantage of opportunities to work with partners who are able to offer and support enriched learning experiences and opportunities for young people's wider involvement in society.'

The young people who took part in the event clearly showed that they were committed to getting the message across and we hope that we can continue to influence young people in this way.'

'Denny - Future Town'

Last year the 2nd Year pupils of Denny High

led to an exhibition at The Lighthouse Design Gallery (Glasgow) supported by Architecture and Design Scotland.

The rich task was formed through a collaborative process between pupils and staff to create a learning activity that would engage pupils in forming links between subjects and the wider world. The development

began with pupil questionnaires and focus groups exploring possibilities and common themes before the overarching theme was defined - What will our world be like in 2025?

This title fired the imagination and led to the identification of links between departments to create a number of learning activities that would engage every pupil.

Art & Design and Design,

Engineering & Technology teamed up in response to pupil reaction to a recent development that had

put Denny on the map and into the news for all the wrong reasons...

In September 2010 the community in Denny asked to get the Carbuncle Award for being the most dismal town in Scotland.

Surprisingly many residents had actively sought this recognition to highlight their dissatisfaction with the condition of the town centre. and encourage the local authority to instigate some long awaited improvements.

Our pupils decided that they wanted the opportunity to contribute their creativity and enterprise in reimagining their town centre.

On the 25th of May 2011, 35 pupils began work to produce a large-scale model of what an alternative town centre might look like. Drawing their inspiration from examples of contemporary architecture, the pupils experimented with various

construction methods for assembling the models participated in a rich task, the results of which have using a combination of balsa wood, coloured card,

glue guns and staples.

With a common desire to activate the community, each segment of the model represented designs for civic amenities that each group felt was important to reinvigorate the town. These ranged from local shops, to sports facilities and places of worship.

The model then featured as a centre piece to the resulting exhibition of work on the completion of the Rich Task after a day and a

> half. This included a broad range of outcomes from a variety of interdisciplinary activities - from the exploration of alternative fuels used in transport, to the use of recycled materials in futuristic fashion and the grow your own food concept in response to concerns over food miles.

The model created by our pupils of 'Denny- Future Town'


then caught the eye of Architecture and Design Scotland, with whom the pupils and staff of Denny High School have collaborated to


form an exhibition.

This exhibition features the final model accompanied by footage of the construction process, interviews between the pupils and local residents and interviews with some of the pupils who took part.

It will be open to the public from the 16th to the 21st of September (inclusive with the exception of the 20th) with a private opening on the 15th in association with the high profile exhibition, 'City Visions 1910/2010 - Urban Planning in Berlin, London, Paris and Chicago'.

Alien Invasion in Denny!

Pupils in P6/7 and P7 were astonished to learn from Jean Weir (Community Green Initiative - CGI) that Denny had been invaded by a strange alien plant called Japanese Knotweed. The CGI wanted some local schools to become involved in producing a leaflet to inform the local community about Japanese Knotweed and how it was invading our native species of plants.

Along with members of CGI and the Falkirk Ranger Service the pupils took part in a fact finding trip along the banks of the River Carron to enable pupils to recognise Japanese Knotweed and how it had taken

hold over large areas of the banks of the River Carron and how it was making it difficult for our native plants to survive.

Japanese Knotweed and were amazed to find out how quickly it Japanese Knotweed. could grow and

destroy not only our local plants but could destroy buildings, roads and paths. The organisers of London's 2012 Olympics revealed that Japanese Knotweed has invaded the sites of two of the main arenas — leaving the games with a clean-up bill which experts predict could top £70m.

Newsflash- Japanese Knotweed in Denny Primary

The pupils were surprised to find that Japanese Knotweed had invaded parts of Denny Primary School - see photo below.

The pupils in P6/7 and P7 produced a leaflet detailing facts and information about Japanese Knotweed which was sent to the CGI group and part of this is incorporated in their leaflet which will be distributed

As part of this topic pupils from P6/7 and P7 took part in Denny Old Church's The pupils researched Eco Service to tell the congregation about their involvement and facts on

to the local communities.



Denny Primary - Safer Routes to School

As part of the safe routes to school programme, P7 pupils at Denny Primary, working with a community artist, designed and then painted murals on the underpass behind the school that runs under Stirling Road.

This underpass has for many years suffered from graffiti and was a dull and unsightly way to get to school. It has been transformed into a bright attractive route encouraging people to take this as a safe route to school.





Fankerton Wildlife garden

Denny Primary's P6 Class, along with pupils from St Patrick's Primary school, assisted the community at Fankerton create a wildlife garden on a waste piece of ground. The people in the local community have been campaigning for many years to upgrade the area and we were more than happy to be of assistance.

Our P6 pupils planted wild flowers and other plants to encourage wildlife such as Butterflies and small mammals.



Nethermains PS - Successful Transition



This year 28 of our Nursery pupils had a 6 week transition programme from May through to June to prepare them for Primary School.

This programme involved joint planning by the existing Primary 1 Teacher, the DHT and the Nursery Team. The focus of the programme was Early Level Health and Well Being.

The P1 pupils, who are now in P2 shared their learning with the nursery pupils and helped to

prepare the nursery pupils for P1. Our School Junior Road Safety Officers were involved in delivering the programme as well as Jen, our Active Schools Co-ordinator. The pupils enjoyed working along side each other and enjoyed working between the Nursery Class and the P1 class. Nursery pupils got a chance to play in the 'big' playground and experience the dinner hall!! There was lots of learning outside and favourite bits involved the big parachute and a Nature Trail.

This transition programme ensured that our new P1 pupils all skipped into school in August with not a tear in sight!

Book Study at Drumbowie Primary

The children and staff at Drumbowie Primary started the term with a book study. The primary 5-7 class focused on 'Running Wild' by Michael Murporgo while the Primary 1-4's looked at Katie Morag Stories.

Cross curricular activities in the older class ranged from researching a tsunami, art work of elephants and butterflies, writing newspaper articles, biographies and diary entries to drama activities where they interviewed the main character from the story. Pupils thoroughly enjoyed a visit from Mary the librarian as she engaged the children in other books by Micheal Morpurgo and latest editions that have been added to the library collection. The class

can't wait to add them to their class library!

The main focus of the primary 1-4 lessons took the form of a comparative study of Katie Morag's island to the pupils home in Standburn. The children worked on developing a model of the island using model magic,







1.1 Four companies notified their interest for the Supply and Installation of a Digital Imaging Printing Press which was advertised through the Public Contracts Scotland Portal and OJEU as an open tender.

2. BACKGROUND

2.1 Printworks has a continuous improvement programme in place to refresh previously leased printing equipment. Financial provision had been made for this program of replacement within the Council's General Services Capital Programme.

3. TENDERS RECEIVED

- One tender was received by the due date of Tuesday 27th September 2011 and opened in accordance with Standing Order 11.2 relating to contracts. The checked tendered price was £277,000 less a trade-in allowance of £38,000.
- As only one tender was received the Print Manager undertook an industry benchmark and the tender received from Presstek Europe Ltd at a net price of £239,000 was considered to offer best value.

4. CONSULTATION

4.1 In accordance with Standing Order 6.2(ii) and 8.4 relating to contracts, the approval of the Chief Governance Officer to enter into the contract for the Supply and Installation of a Digital Imaging Printing Press was sought and received.
