Seaguli Trust Project

The Seagull Trust is a charity which provides free canal cruising in Scotland for people with special needs. A current project is the conversion of the Highland Seagull, into an educational facility for schools, and the Media Team at St. Mungo's has been documenting its progress on film.

The boat is being converted by A. L. Gordon at their Bankside premises and is due to be put in the water on 22nd. June. So far, the team – Christopher Quilietti, Callum Timms and Samuel Goldie – have filmed the boat during its conversion, and have filmed at the Seagull Trust's Bantaskine boathouse.

They will also be filming pupils from the Thistle Unit at Kinnaird Primary enjoying a canal cruise on one of the Trust's other boats, and filming the official launch by HRH The Princess Royal on 6th July.

S4 Enterprise and Employability Day

Michael Matheson launched our S4 Enterprise and Employability Day on 19th March. The day was designed to establish links with local employers and highlight different routes to get into different careers. Many local employers attended and provided excellent advice and support to pupils.

The day was supported by My Future's in Falkirk and pupils gained an insight into the different opportunities open to them in the Falkirk area.

Pupils also completed a series of workshops to help prepare them for their work experience and took part in an essential health and safety course.


S2 Technology Challenge Day

In February all S2 pupils took part in a Technology Challenge Day. Pupils' activities included the 'Jiant Jaffa Cake Company' which focused on production methods and quality control.

One of the activities had an Olympic theme with

pupils using a laser cutter to create designs for a new stadium and a range of medals. Other activities included designing bridges with help from the institute of civil engineers, testing a range of crash helmets for eggs as well as pupils designing their own computer games.

All these different activities allowed pupils to see different areas of technology education and



they got to use problem solving skills in real life applications.

It is no wonder St Mungo's High has achieved the Gold award for Enterprise for the past two years.

Budding Artists

Competitions are nothing new to the pupils of St Mungo's High and the teachers in the Art and Design department ensure that pupils' work is acknowledged and celebrated and does not become just another painting for the fridge.

In the past pupils have been highly commended in and even won local and national competitions.

Pupils have been involved in national projects including competitions set by the RSA and the National Galleries of Scotland. But the pupils at St Mungo's have recently been using Live Projects and Competitions to get more involved in their local community.

A competition by St Bernadette's Primary asked pupils to design a

logo for their new school due to open in August 2012. Pupil's were eager to get involved and loved the idea that one of their design's could become a School logo that would be around for years. The work entered was of such a high standard that three pupils from St Mungo's (Caitlin MacInnes, Chellsi Thomson and Jenna Callaghan, all S3) made it to the final five and each were awarded a runner up prize.

Pupils and staff loved being a part of something so close to home and this has led to the development of other projects within the local community.

Pupils in the Art Department are currently working on a research project in conjunction with The Waterways Trust Scotland, British Waterways and cycling charity Sustrans.

The pupils have been set the brief to come up with six portrait candidates who can be past or present with a strong connection to Falkirk to become figures on their local 'Portrait Bench'.

The 'Portrait Bench' is a simple wooden bench which will feature 3 life-size characters chosen by the community. The figures will be cut from Corten steel (like the Angel of the North) so they will

weather to a fine rust surface and become a natural part of the landscape. The bench will be situated along the canal, very close to St Mungo's High.

St Mungo's pupils will be responsible for selecting one of the three figures to be featured on the bench. Pupils will research the people who could be featured and will report back to the class. After narrowing the selection down to six candidates the vote will go to the local community. There will be a public ballot at the Falkirk Wheel and an online vote to decide which of St Mungo's choices will be featured. When complete there will be a national collection of over 230 portraits.

Formula 1 in schools

Move over McLaren and Red Bull. St Mungo's has its own F1 Teams – "Dynamite" and "Road Rage". Both teams have been researching, designing and manufacturing their own car. Kai, Nathan and Ruarhi formed Road Rage and Heather, Shelby, Caitlin and Matthew formed Team Dynamite.

The Scottish regional finals this year were held in Kirkcaldy and involved teams from across Scotland. There was a day of competition in which the teams had to give a presentation, have their design portfolio judged and race their cars. Road Rage car beat all the competition and was awarded fastest F1 Class car at the Scottish Championships, managing to fly down the 10 metre track in just under 1.3 secs.


Team Road Rage impressed the judges with their innovative ways of communicating with each other and caught the eye of potential sponsors on Facebook. The team won the Innovative Thinking Award.

Team Dynamite also impressed the judges with their team identity and won the 'Best Team Identity Award' for Scotland.



Faith in Action

Putting 'faith into action' has always been a fundamental part of the ethos of St Mungo's High and pupils are regularly given opportunities to reflect on their faith.

We have a strong chaplaincy team which meets regularly and delivers a range of liturgical events during the course of each session. A special time is our feast day, even more so this year when we were joined by Cardinal Keith O'Brien, local clergy and staff and pupils from local primary schools.

Pupils have the opportunity to support and care for their fellow pupils. This can be in the form of support for personal and social issues or helping junior pupils with literacy



and numeracy. Senior pupils receive training in peer mediation.

A very strong feature is our charity work. This year pupils have raised over £25,000 for a range of charities. Pupils also donated over 70 food parcels to SVDP to distribute to families at Christmas time.

Our retreat programmes give pupils time to reflect on their life, hopes and aspirations prior to making course choices.

Pupils are also given the opportunity to consider issues such as social justice and helping others through Lenten campaigns and ongoing work with Life Groups, Fairtrade and Justice and Peace groups.

Eighteen pupils from St Mungo's went to Lourdes.

With the launch of "This Is Our Faith", we are called not only to profess our faith, but to show example to everyone that we meet. Our pupils certainly do that.



Enterprising for Outdoor Learning


At the end of last session, as part of our school evaluation, our pupils said that they would like more opportunities for outdoor learning and an improvement in their playground facilities. Our Primary 7 pupils rose to the challenge and have really put their mark on the school this year. They decided to organise a Winter Fayre to raise enough funds to make a change.

Supported by Mr. Short, the children created a business plan to establish a course of action. They quickly started writing to local businesses, organisations and parents for their support. They produced a profit and expenditure report which provided detailed information on how our whole school community could get involved. As a result of the children's creative advertising campaign, a great deal of interest surrounded the event.

The day was a huge success and raised £2700. From a teaching perspective, this

was an exciting way to deliver literacy, numeracy and technologies within one interdisciplinary context. The children gained some very valuable skills for life and work which may well see them as entrepreneurs one day.

Although we raised a lot of money, to make the changes the children had asked for, we still required



additional funds. A small group of children worked with Mr. Short to make an *Awards for All* application to the Big Lotto Fund. Our application was successful and we were awarded £7300.

The combined funds meant that we were able to purchase an outdoor classroom and an adventure trim trail. The entire school community are thoroughly enjoying the new additions to our school and staff look forward to enhancing the learning experiences for our pupils through the use of these resources.

Rights Respecting Schools






Children have been receiving awards for displaying the Olympic and Paralympic values during PE lessons. To encourage children to be good sports people, awards are given out


We had a great time trying on knights' armour and looking at the weapons they would have used.


Back in the class we learned about the line of succession from Malcolm Canmore to The Maid of Norway and we decided if we would have signed the Ragman Roll.

Living Eggs in Primary 1 and 2

P1, P1/2 and P2 participated in a Science project called Living Eggs. This was a unique 10 day experience which allowed the children to see at first hand the chicks hatch from eggs. There was great excitement throughout the whole school when the eggs were delivered on the first day in the incubator.

By the end of the second day we started to see some cracks in two of the eggs. The children could not wait to get to school the next day to see if the chicks had hatched. They were so excited to see two fluffy new chicks that morning. We followed their progress carefully all day and were rewarded with the opportunity of watching a chick hatch before our eyes. The children were so amazed to see how much effort it took for the chick to hatch and how rapidly it's appearance changed to a fluffy chick. We used ICT extensively in this project and were lucky to catch the hatching live on video. We posted this on our website and word soon spread through the school



enabling the whole school to interact with the project. Over the next day seven more chicks hatched giving us 9 chicks in total (5 girls and 4 boys). Their next step was to move to the brooder box. Each class had the opportunity to name a chick and have the chicks to stay in their classroom.

From a teaching point of view this project impacted powerfully on so many areas of the curriculum. It generated so much interest and involvement from parents and grandparents from the school community. We also received messages from other local schools through our Visitor's page on the website. The children could receive a certificate to record their involvement through our Enterprise event.

Primary 3 News

Primary 3 have had a very exciting year! First, we had a barn owl named Plop come to visit our class. He helped us learn about the importance of feelings and how important it is to respect others within our class. Since, he has been travelling around Bo'ness and learning about the local area with the children.

Throughout P3, we have been doing a lot of co-operative learning and working with our peers. This includes our maths work, topic work and lots of other learning experiences. We also have our very special 'Heart Partners' and we like to spend time with them discussing our feelings from day-to-day. Our 'Heart Partners' also work with us during Active Literacy to help us learn our words.


Wider Achievements

All classes have made use of Callendar Park to enhance their topic work; autumn walks. Roman workshops, WW II workshop, Victorians workshop.


Eco Initiatives

Oliver has many additional features which ALICE did not provide. We are now able to add websites as well as interact/search alternative providers e.g. SCRAN and BBC Bitesize. If there are other alternative providers that you would like us to add please contact Susan Campbell at LSS. The home page feature allows us to promote literacy events and link them to resources we hold or where relevant pages on GLOW e.g. Olympics, Diamond Jubilee, Author events online.

Library Support for Schools subscribes to a Bibliographic Document Supply service (BDS) which allows us to upload book cover images to Oliver and we are able to upload images of our other resources e.g. masks, puppets. The carousel feature is also very attractive.





My friend, Mrs Shiela Forsyth, who was a Primary 7 teacher in Shieldhill Primary School, moved two years ago to live in Hong Kong.



Scottish Primary Schools Cross Country Championships

Over 30 of the children travelled in a bus provided by the Council's Active Schools Team.


For all of the pupils, this event was the first time they had competed at this level in an athletics competition. The majority had been encouraged to do so after their performances throughout the winter in the local league, which has produced two individual winners in the last 5 years. Caroline Lawless, the Vics Treasurer, and Additional Support for Learning Administrator in the Council's Education Service was instrumental in encouraging the schools to enter the pupils and organising the travel arrangements. Caroline also travelled with the pupils, some of whom were the sole representatives from their schools, and parents to encourage the pupils at the event.

The races are split into Girls and Boys at each P6 and P7 stages, and additionally into A to K and L to Z by school name to keep the size of the fields to manageable levels for the 1500m races. In a fantastic day, enjoyed by all, the talent in the Falkirk Council area was evident from the first race to the last. In the first race for P6 girls (A to K) Kirsten Lawrie of Airth Primary School was the first Falkirk Council pupil to finish in 26th position. Flora Johnstone of Ladeside Primary was first home in the (L to Z) race in 30th place. In the P6 boys (A to K) race Carronshore Primary's Max Rintoul ran superbly to finish 2nd with a time of 5 mins 48 secs and is pictured with his medal, was closely followed by teammate Owen Lake in 4th place (6min 03secs) as the Carronshore boys, with Ross Gauld the important third counter in 49th place, finished an excellent 5th in the team competition. In the (L to Z) race Thomas Boyle representing Maddiston Primary just pipped Kane Elliot of St Francis. The boys finishing 21st and 22nd respectively.

Jessica Christie of Kinnaird Primary was the first Falkirk pupil home in the P7 girls (A to K) race, covering the 1500 metre course in 6 min 50 secs to finish 19th. Katy McGonigal of St Margarets was 34th in the (L to Z) race. Bantaskin Primary provided the only boys in the P7 (A to L) race Scott Richardson-Peat was 37th and Kerr Mitchell 41st.

The best results for the Falkirk Council area came in the days final event, the P7 boys (L to Z) race. A superb run by Paul Hutchison of Larbert Village saw him become the 3rd local athlete to win an individual gold in the last 5 years. Paul is pictured with his medal. Pauls winning time was an impressive 5 min 21 secs. St Andrews Primary became the areas second school in the local leagues 9 year history to win team medals. Excellent runs from Aaron Reid who was 4th in a time of 5 min 47 secs, Harrison Glassey 14th in 6min 08 secs, and Lewis Pentecost in 41st place resulted in the boys finishing 3rd Team and gaining the bronze medals. The St Andrews pupils are also pictured with their medals.

Thanks goes to all the teachers and helpers who provided training for the pupils throughout the winter which resulted in these terrific performances.

1. INTRODUCTION

1.1 This report is to advise members of the actions taken by Development Services in relation to the Disabled Persons' Parking Places (Scotland) Act 2009, (the 2009 Act).

1.2 This report also confirms the introduction of a Performance Indicator, separate from the requirements of the 2009 Act.

2. BACKGROUND

- A report titled "Disabled Persons' Parking Places (Scotland) Act 2009" was placed before the Environment and Community Safety Committee on the 25 October 2011. This report updated Members on progress made implementing The Disabled Persons' Parking Places (Scotland) Act 2009, and explained the duties placed upon local authorities in relation to disabled persons' parking places. The 2009 Act requires local authorities to submit a performance report to the Scottish Government within three months from the end of the financial year, i.e. by the end of June. A copy of the report, the contents of which is prescribed in the 2009 Act, is enclosed as Schedule 1.
- 2.2 At the Committee Meeting of the 25 October 2011, Members discussed the introduction of a Performance Indicator separate from the reporting requirements of the 2009 Act. A Performance Indicator compares performance against a target. The proposed target to assess performance is that 80% of applications will have Traffic Regulation Orders (TRO's) in place within 120 days.
- 2.3 The Performance Indicator for the 2011/2012 financial year shows 87% of applications were processed within 120 days. The Performance Report is enclosed as Appendix A.

3 ON-STREET DISABLED PERSONS' PARKING PLACES: INITIAL DUTIES

3.1 Section 4 of the 2009 Act required local authorities to identify every advisory on-street disabled persons' parking place in its area and decide whether it was an 'eligible parking place'. This initial requirement was discussed in the report placed before Members on the 25 October 2011.

4 ON-STREET DISABLED PERSONS' PARKING PLACES: ON-GOING DUTIES

- 4.1 Section 5 of the 2009 Act makes provision for individuals or organisations to apply for an on-street disabled persons' parking place.
- 4.2 The 2009 Act requires local authorities to report on the number of applications for disabled bays received and the number provided. It also requires local authorities to list the time taken to commence the statutory process for providing a bay from when it is determined that a bay can be provided.
- 4.3 Between 1 April 2011 and 31 March 2012, Falkirk Council received 86 applications for on-street disabled persons' parking places. Of these applications, 58 traffic regulation Orders were commenced to provide a bay.

5 OFF-STREET DISABLED PERSONS' PARKING PLACES: INITIAL DUTIES

- 5.1 The 2009 Act permits applications to be received for on-street disabled persons' parking places but not for off-street parking places.
- 5.2 Section 6 of the 2009 Act required local authorities to identify every advisory off-street disabled persons' parking place in its area and decide whether it was an 'eligible parking place'. Thereafter the authority had to determine whether a TRO could be promoted to make the bay legally enforceable. The main factor affecting the ability to promote a TRO for advisory disabled persons' parking places is whether the private land owner wishes the Order to be made.
- 5.3 Local authorities are required to undertake this exercise every two years. Development Service first undertook this duty during the 2010/2011 financial year and will do so again this financial year.
- 5.4 Disabled persons' parking bays in car parks operated by Development Services are generally compliant with the requirement of the 2009 Act. Discussions have taken place with other Services who operate car parks containing disabled persons' parking places and these Services are currently collating the information required to allow TRO's to be drafted. It is the intention to publish these TRO's this financial year.

6 DISABLED PERSONS' PARKING PLACES WITHIN DEVELOPMENTS

- 6.1 Section 7 of the 2009 Act requires Falkirk Council to identify advisory off-street disabled persons' parking places associated with new developments. The authority must determine whether a TRO could be promoted to make any bay legally enforceable. Again, the main factor affecting the ability to promote a TRO for advisory disabled persons' parking places is whether the private land owner wishes the Order to be made.
- 6.2 The 2009 Act is intended to cover car parks associated with retail, private leisure and sport or tourist type businesses where the public are actively encouraged to use the car parks.

Development Services have contacted those developers that have received planning permission for relevant business types during the 2011/2012 financial year to determine whether they wish TRO's to be promoted. There have been 30 bays provided over five separate developments. Responses are still awaited from the developers.

7 OFF-STREET DISABLED PERSONS' PARKING PLACES: ON-GOING DUTIES

7.1 Section 8 of the 2009 Act requires local authorities to determine the locations of advisory disabled persons' parking bays in off-street car parks biennially. As advised in item 5.3 above, Development Services will undertake this exercise this financial year.

8 CONCLUSIONS

The implementation of TRO's in relation to disabled persons' parking places located in publically accessible car parks operated by the various Services within Falkirk Council is currently being progressed with the intention of publishing TRO's this financial year.



1. INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 Progress with the preparation of the Falkirk Local Development Plan (FLDP) reached a key milestone over the past year, with the Main Issues Report (MIR) having been approved for consultation by the Council in October 2011, and published in November 2011.
- 1.2 Consultation on the MIR, which is the main focus of public engagement, was carried out during a 12 week period between 18th November 2011 and 10th February 2012, and used a range of participatory approaches to involve people and organisations:
 - the community roadshows in libraries, schools, community centres and supermarkets succeeded in drawing in over 600 people;
 - special Community Council meetings were attended by some 140 people;
 - 54 agency representatives attended 3 themed stakeholder workshops; and
 - over 3000 visits to the FLDP web page have been recorded.
- 1.3 Just over 1000 written responses were received to the MIR. These, along with the notes from the roadshow events and workshops, are now being logged and analysed to inform the process of preparing the final Proposed Plan.

2.0 RESPONSE FROM SCOTTISH GOVERNMENT

2.1 One of the key respondents to the MIR consultation is Scottish Government. They are required to be closely involved in the LDP preparation and Scottish Ministers ultimately approve the plan. The Scottish Government's Directorate for the Built Environment has provided the following supportive comments on the Council's approach to development planning as expressed in the MIR.

Form and content

2.2 The MIR is a well thought out and thorough document, outlining a clear vision for the future of the FLDP area. The mapping of the different growth options, and illustrating the preferred options including the green belt map, are very helpful.

Housing growth

2.3 In terms of housing, we found Falkirk's approach in the MIR to be a good example: evidence based, realistic, with a commitment to delivering a generous supply. Overall the approach to green belt is very good and follows the requirements set out in Scottish Planning Policy.

Climate Change

We consider that the MIR's text coverage of climate change is better than many other MIR so far.

Flood risk

We would also like to particularly highlight our support for the approach towards flooding, including the preferred option to prioritise measures to address flood risk in Grangemouth.

Green Network

We commend Falkirk's track record on delivering greenspace projects on the ground. We strongly support the development of a Green Network for Falkirk that is intended to complement the growth strategy

Public engagement

- We felt the summary of the MIR in your Development Plan Newsletter was very useful in providing an overview of the main issues, and are sure communities will have found it helpful.
- We would like to acknowledge the considerable efforts put into the public engagement programme on the MIR, including the community roadshow events at schools, shopping centres and supermarkets.

3.0 CONCLUSION AND NEXT STEPS

- 3.1 The above response from the Scottish Government's Directorate for the Built Environment is encouraging and offers broad support for the form and content of the Falkirk Local Development Plan Main Issues Report.
- The full complement of submissions to the MIR is still being processed and analysed. Once this task has been completed a report on the implications for the next stage i.e. the LDP Proposed Plan, will be presented to Committee.
