1. INTRODUCTION

1.1 The Hay Group Management Limited - ESCI

As part of the Leadership Development Strategy, Education Services have, since 2010, provided members of staff with the opportunity to undertake an Emotional Social Competency Inventory (ESCI) using an online programme managed and licensed by The Hay Group.

The programme provides:

- An online system for completing ESCI
- A 360° tool which supports and validates self assessment
- A comparison maker/benchmark with other public sector organisations results
- A verbatim comments section
- An analysis of strengths and areas for development. and supports
- Improved performance, motivation and teamwork
- Equips managers with Emotional Intelligence skills which help them to collaborate with and manage others
- Complements our leadership development programme

1.2 Progress thus far

- Education Services currently has six members of staff fully trained to provide 1 to 1 feedback for participants.
- 73 individuals who have undertaken the inventory
- 19 individuals who will undertake the inventory during the 2012-13 session
- A positive evaluation from individuals who had undertaken the programme prior to June 2012 with 90% saying that they were using feedback as part of their PRD and making comments such as To have 1 hour dedicated to talking about myself has been a pure joy '~ You're not telling me anything I didn't know now I will do something about it'.

1.3 Rationale for request to invoke Clause 5.6

The contract is deemed to be for specialised work and is considered to be in the best interests of the Council for the following reasons

1. Having engaged with our colleagues in Procurement and other services we have been unable to identify a range of organisations that could quote or tender for this contract due to the specific nature of the service provided and the nature of the licensing attached to the

product.

2. Key to the success of the programme is the facility to measure ourselves against a 'Norm' group of other local authorities. As we moved through the programme with our own staff we began to develop a 'Falkirk Norm' group. To move to another provider or a different

programme would mean we lose this advantage.

3. We have seven members of our staff fully trained to provide feedback which reduces our

costs. To buy in this service would cost £600 per feedback session.

4. We are currently benefiting from the economy of scale as our numbers going through the programme have grown we have accessed a discount of approximately 20% in the costs per

person.

5. Our anticipated costs over the coming two years would be approx £19k

(100 individuals @ f.95 = f.9500. X 2 years = f.19500.)

2. ACTION TAKEN

2.1 In accordance with Standing Order 5.6 I accepted the exemption request submitted by Anne Pearson, Curriculum Support Manager, Education Services for The Hay Management Group Limited, in the sum of £19k in respect of the Supply of Emotional



Two of our P7 pupils were selected to carry the torch at the P7 Olympics at Grangemouth - not




All pupils who took part in our school games

looking forward to celebrations as the session progresses. If anyone has a link to Antonine and can help with photographs or information please get in touch with the school office!




