1. INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 On 17 March 2011, the Scottish Parliament approved the Public Services Reform (General Teaching Council for Scotland) Order 2011 which set out the Government's plan for the granting of independent status to GTC Scotland from April 2012. As part of this legislation the Government placed the GTC Scotland under a duty to introduce a scheme of re-accreditation for teachers.
- 1.2 The Government recognised that a, "supportive but rigorous system of professional review and development" would help to confirm that teachers have maintained high standards to ensure the future quality of professional teaching skills across Scotland's schools.
- 1.3 GTC Scotland adopted the title "Professional Update" for the process described by the Government as re-accreditation.
- 1.4 In addition Falkirk Council Education Services are currently implementing a revised Employee Review and Development (ERD) scheme; full implementation target is for session 2014-15.
- 1.6 The Professional Update will ensure that teachers have:
 - A responsibility to consider their development needs.
 - An entitlement to a system of supportive Professional Review and Development (ERD) that can.
 - Assist them to identify constructive ways to update their skills.
 - Provide access to opportunities which can address those areas identified as requiring support.
 - Help them to manage change.
 - Offer a focus on ways in which they can enhance their careers.
- 1.7 As part of the national roll out a selection of Falkirk schools will pilot the Professional Update process during session 2013-14.
- 1.8 All Falkirk teachers (approximately 1700 FTE) will be involved in the national roll out during session 2014-15.

- 1.9 The team working on the implementation of Falkirk Council Education Services' revised Employee Review and Development scheme (ERD) undertook an extensive evaluation of the system currently used for booking professional learning courses and found that it lacked the functionality to support the processes associated with Professional Update. Education Services have always maintained a separate professional learning course booking system due to the volume and complexity of courses, venues, and support.
- 1.10 A teacher data management and tracking system is 'mission critical' to the Falkirk Council Education Services fulfilling its responsibilities with regard to Professional Update.
- 1.11 In order to meet our responsibilities as a Professional Update pilot authority a data management system is required to be in place by August 2013.
- 1.12 In addition, the data management system needs to improve access to CPD opportunities and increase ownership of the ERD process, which will in turn support the modernisation of the workforce.
- 1.13 This approach will allow us to support Goal 1 of "One Council-One Plan" the Corporate Plan for Falkirk Council 2012-17.

2. RESEARCH UNDERTAKEN

- 2.1 The ERD Implementation team met with the Human Resources and Customer First Corporate team to discuss the potential of the Corporate CPD Management system ResourceLink. It was discovered that ResourceLink falls significantly short of the required specification.
- The ERD Implementation team consulted with providers of data management solutions. The quotes provided for a bespoke system to be developed to our specification ranged from £15,000 to £25,000 with ongoing annual costs in the range of £5,000 to £10,000. A bespoke system would also require design and implementation time in excess of 12 months.
- 2.3 The team engaged with other Local Authorities to discuss a) how they addressed the reporting needs of GTC Scotland and b) the evaluation of their data management systems. During this engagement it was discovered that 40% of Local Authorities are already using Gateway Shared Systems CPD Manager.
- Gateway Shared Systems have successfully provided Education Services with Career Planning support via PlanIT plus and are contracted to deliver WorkIT to support the schools work experience programme. The team met with representatives of Gateway Shared Systems to discuss functionality and level of service provided by the CPD Manager product.

The CPD Manager system:

- meets the requirements of all employees of Education Services;
- supports cross authority co-operation and joint expansion;
- provides an easy to use and widely accessible web interface;

- stores relevant documents which can be customised;
- provides a range of standard reports;
- offers direct reporting to the GTCS Professional Update;
- provides automatic notifications that support our communications channels.

The database holds information about:

- the establishments;
- staff located in these establishments;
- ERD conversations, planning and reviews;
- CPD training opportunities;
- course applications;
- course waiting lists;
- attendance and evaluations;
- staff CPD plans;
- course running costs;
- course venue locations.

3. COST IMPLICATIONS

- 3.1 Based on 3000-3500 staff accounts, the entire Gateway CPD Manager will cost £12,000 per year. Given our embedded use of Gateway products (PlanIT Plus and WorkIT) this has been reduced to £10,000 per year.
- 3.2 The added value achieved through contracting Gateway is the benefits gained from working in conjunction with 12 other Local Authorities. The collegiate approach to the development of the system will support any unforeseen changes to the specification requirements.

4. RATIONALE FOR REQUEST TO INVOKE CLAUSE 5.6

- 4.1 The contract is deemed to be for specialised work and is considered to be in the best interests of the Council for the following reasons.
- 4.2 The CPD Manager meets the requirements of the Professional Update process.
- 4.3 It will increase access to staff development opportunities.
- 4.4 Represents value for money.
- 4.5 Is ready for immediate use with no additional customisation.
- 4.6 Will reduces staff admin time and printing costs.
- 4.7 Meets the specification for an effective data management system for the PRD and PLP process.
- 4.8 Is currently employed by 40% of Scottish Local Authorities and therefore supports cross authority working and ongoing software development.

- 5. ACTION TAKEN
- 5.1 In accordance with Standing Order 5.6 I accepted the exemption request submitted by Anne Pearson, Curriculum Support Manager, Education Services for Gateway Shared Services in the sum of £10k in respect of the provision of an Online CPD/Professional Update/PRD Management System for Falkirk Council from April 2013. The contract will expire on 30 June 2014.

It's all good news from Library Support for Schools

Awards for All project

Library Support for Schools successfully bid to Awards for All to set up a project working with vulnerable young people who have experienced the trauma of loss and are mostly drawn from families who live in areas of disadvantage.

The young people from Tremanna and Wallace Crescent come together each week at Meadowbank Library to work with professional storytellers and animators to create a story and to animate it. The first session was in November last year.

The film will be launched in the Studio at Falkirk Town Hall in March this year and it is hoped that the goal of producing and showing a film to tell their story will offer an opportunity to give this group of young people a voice.

Russian Visit

In November, as part of their best practice study tour to Scotland a group of 12 Russian directors of library services visited Library Support for Schools in Falkirk to find out about the RED Book Award. Four pupils from Braes HS and Larbert HS joined the delegation to share their experiences of being part of the Book Award.

"Please thank your colleagues at Falkirk for such a warm welcome. The young people were really great too and I will get letters of gratitude written to them as soon as I can. Everything was excellent."

Reading 'Flash Mob'

Also in November, as part of Book Week Scotland, Library Support for Schools organised a Reading 'flash mob' with pupils from Windsor Park School and Bantaskin PS. It seems to have been the only one of its kind in Scotland, so Scottish Book Trust joined the event to film it. Over 50 children and staff met at the Steeple in Falkirk with a book of their choice and at 11am the reading out loud began, starting with one person, then another and building up to everyone reading. At the signal (a whistle) the reading suddenly stopped and everyone put their book under their arm and walked slowly off as if nothing had happened!

January 2013

RED Book Awards

RED stands for Read, Enjoy, Debate and the young people have read the shortlisted books, talked about them, wrote reviews and voted for their favourite title. This process culminates in the award ceremony where the winner is announced.

The RED Book Award ceremony was held in Falkirk Town Hall in January. Around 300 young people were joined by invited guests and the shortlisted authors. The day involved the young people presenting a creative interpretation of each of the shortlisted titles, there were senior pupils acting as reporters for the day and guided by the Press Office, pupils from St Mungo's FM (school radio) were there to record the event. There were also welcome introductions to the authors by the



Blackness Primary School - Micro Tyco

Pupils at Blackness Primary School took part in Micro Tyco during the month of November. The 31 pupils split into 6 teams of mixed ages and were each given a £1 micro-loan. They then had to use all their entrepreneurial skills and flair to turn the £1 into as much money as possible. The groups had to decide upon a company name, logo and create badges. It called upon creative thinking skills alongside core skills and gave the children an insight into enterprise and employment.

The Moneymakers teamed up with the Golden gates to do car washes after buying cloths and cleaning liquid. They later went on to run a tuck shop and a Pudsey Hunt respectively.

The Right Choice bought sweets and ran a competition to guess how many sweets were in the jar. They went on to make and sell biscuits, make and sell origami cats and dogs and finally face painting.

The Hals bought some compost and planted bulbs, which we had in school along with pots, after decorating the pots. They then ran doughnut hanging and "dookin" for apples followed by LEGO challenge.

The Pineapples bought fruit, then more fruit ... then more fruit and kept the school supplied with fabulous fruit salads. They also ran a quiz competition and bought After Eights for the adult winner and Haribo sweets for the child winner.

Finally, the Best Bits organised a pin the sting on the bumble bee, a tuck shop and a drawing competition.

Everyone had great fun and the competition to see which group had made the most money was keenly contested with the Hals coming out as marginal winners. Overall we made £160 from our £6 investment.







Gambian Visitor at Blackness Primary

Blackness pupils entertained Muhammed, who was visiting from the Gambia. He had met, made friends and forged links with pupils from Boness Academy when visiting last summer.

As part of the P7 transition project, he came to talk to our pupils about his culture and country. Our pupils asked lots of questions followed by a lively but thoughtful discussion comparing Scottish and Gambian life.

Muhammed led a fun workshop with the P7 pupils in the art of tie dying which is one of his family's

traditional skills and which he learned to do as a child. Our pupils had a great time and each created a stunning t shirt.

He returns to the Gambia with pupils from Bo'ness Academy who are going there to visit and to help build toilet blocks and work on other projects.



Johari News at Bo'ness Public Primary School

I am a P3 teacher at Bo'ness Public Primary School. The children have been working so hard this year on our topic of Fairtrade and are currently working towards regaining our school Fairtrade Status for 2013/14. I am over whelmed with how these young children have worked so hard with such enthusiasm to help children who are less fortunate at them. All money raised from our Fairtrade efforts will be donated to the Johari Foundation, so not only are we helping to promote Fairtrade products but were also promoting education and training in other countries too.

The children so far have raised almost £400 and with a Johari Fashion Show to take place on Friday 1st March (as part of Fairtrade Fortnight) and a Fairtrade Coffee afternoon to be held in our community on the 11th March. To celebrate the children's success to maintain our school as a Fairtrade School and helping such a worthwhile cause (Johari) we held a press release event at the school on Thursday 21st March. The children ran this event and it gave them the opportunity to experience what a press release would be like, in a very educational, but fun way and a great way to see the children get recognition for their hard work in the media. It also helped the children develop their team-work skills, planning skills, literacy skills and presentation skills. We presented the following information

- * How we turned £1 into £94 (with the help of lolly pops) in aid of Johari.
- ★ We talked about the Johari T-Shirt Competition the children are currently taking part in.
- ★ We talked about what makes a Fairtrade School / the fun they have had working towards this.
- ★ We talked about how they have raised money for Johari and why they have chosen Johari as their charity.
- ★ The amount of money they have raised for Johari and we handed over a cheque.
- ★ The chance for reporters to ask the children questions.

Johari Foundation is a registered charity in Scotland. They help those who are less fortunate in Kenya by running various programmes such as training to trailer clothes. The clothes the children will be modelling at our Fashion Show are examples of their work. Also, three teachers from Falkirk Council (including myself) will be going out to Kenya this summer to help at a summer school. We are going to be passing on our musical, art and language talents.

BO'NESS SCHOOLS REACH FOR THE STARS

Over 150 P5 pupils from all six primary schools in Bo'ness have been trying a wide range of art forms under the expert guidance of artist and sculptor Susheila Jamieson. For nine weeks the pupils have been experimenting with 3-D structures, photography, print-making, graphics and sculpture, to create a staggering array of work inspired by their local cinema: the Hippodrome.

The initiative has concluded the year-long Hippodrome 100 celebrations, marking the centenary of the opening of Scotland's first purpose-built cinema, and was devised as a way to engage young people for ideas on future public art for the town.

Susheila Jamieson said,

"The project has been a mini public art project in itself. All the pupils had to work together as a team, discuss argue and agree a lot of things like design, making and displaying banners. They have had

to consider things like texture, colour, materials, scale and context, all of which will make them really informed contributors to any future developments involving their town. Along the way the children have learnt such a lot of essential life skills – they did very well!"

Susheila led weekly sessions with the support of teachers at Blackness, Bo'ness Public, Deanburn, Grange, Kinneil and St Mary's RC Primary Schools. As well as rolling their sleeves up for art creations, the pupils had sessions in the Hippdrome itself, 'virtually' exploring the town using Google Earth, and also undertaking a special visit to Jupiter Artland, the privately owned land near Ratho where the owners have commissioned and installed works by some of today's leading artists, sculptors and land artists.

Alison Strauss, Arts Development Officer (Film and Media), Falkirk Community Trust who oversaw the project said,

"With the support of the dedicated teaching staff the pupils have worked brilliantly on this project throwing themselves into every new learning experience that Susheila presented them with. It's been great to see them developing their ideas in different contexts and working closely not only with their own classmates but also with pupils from neighbouring schools. The results are genuinely impressive and I'm really glad that the wider community and visitors to Bo'ness will get a chance to see some of the work that has been produced at this exhibition."

Walking Bus 2013



Whitecross Primary School - Buckets of Love



Jennifer Terris, Litter Education Support Officer, had a baby boy in November, only a couple of weeks after handing the reins over to me as her maternity cover until the summer. Jennifer has a great relationship with many schools, which has culminated in a fantastic new teaching resource, the "Kaptain Kleen Action Pack". Designed in collaboration with Ann Easton of Bantaskin Primary, the pack contains fun facts about litter as well as quizzes, games and challenges. It provides a timeline of litter, starting with cavemen and travelling right through Ancient Egypt, Ancient Greece and Medieval Britain all the way up to present day Falkirk. The pack will shortly be issued to every school in the district, so keep a look-out!

The project which has been keeping me the busiest since I started in November has been a study into litter prevention and recycling in schools, part-funded by Zero Waste Scotland. Three schools were



selected to take part, based on the variety of bin infrastructure present in each school. St Bernadette's, being a brand-new school, was fitted with colour-coded, dual-purpose litter and recycling bins in all areas including the playground and dininghall. St Mary's in Bo'ness and Carmuirs Primary haven't got the same level of equipment, but we have been running an intensive education programme in all 3 schools to see whether it's super bins or super education that really gets pupils recycling! We went into all 3 schools for a week in November, weighing and measuring every scrap of waste and recycling, including playground litter and school dinner waste. For several weeks afterwards we were back in the schools doing anti-litter talks, litter orienteering, and paper-making sessions to highlight the

importance of recycling. Then we returned last week to weigh and measure everything all over again, and were delighted to see how the recycling rates had improved. We will go back for a final week of weighing and measuring in March so watch this space as we discover what really works!

We did some fun things to promote the study, including sending the P1's and P2's from the participating schools to see "Wombling Free" at the Bo'ness Hippodrome, and running a poetry competition to produce "Poems For Bins". A professional poet came into the schools to help the children write poems that will appear on vinyl stickers on the local litter bins nearest to each school. You can see some of the poems on the right. We are extending the poetry scheme to Grangemouth schools this month, and budget permitting, we are very keen to roll it out even further as it helps the children to gain "ownership" of their local bins and encourages some civic pride! Do get in touch if you think that your school would benefit from this scheme.

Looking ahead, we are planning a big anti-dog-fouling campaign in Bonnybridge, working with St Joseph's, Antonine and Bonnybridge Primary as well as local groups and concerned residents.

Finally, hundreds of primary pupils have taken part in our annual "Spring Clean" litter pick events over the last few years, and it's almost time to don our gloves and litter-pickers again! This year the campaign is called "Clean Up Scotland", but the drill is the same - register online with Keep Scotland Beautiful, then get in touch with me to book your equipment. I'll bring you everything you need, including litter pickers, hoops and gloves. I will also arrange to have your bags of rubbish uplifted, and the details of your event will be entered into our league table of school litter-picks...with results to be published in an upcoming edition of Education Matters.



and thickness and then brought them back to school to bind them together to form a star. They were very effective and we then used them to decorate the hall.




The children also took part in a tremendous

Today there are children, young and old people who will not have anything to eat. Their cupboards are empty. They may have been empty for a few days and there is no knowing when or if they will be filled again. This is not a war zone or an area affected by a natural disaster. This is here and now in Falkirk, today!

Recent and proposed changes to the benefits system will see more people slip through. These changes will affect not just those who don't have a job, but also those in low paid jobs who rely on benefits to help them make ends meet.



Friends of the Carron Dams. The group have put forward a proposal which will hopefully lead to Local Nature Reserve




status for the site this year.

It was a fabulous event, enjoyed by many staff, parents and pupils of both schools. We were very proud of all our competitors.



that all classes had been learning. I am in primary six and we sang a song about 'The Midges' and recited the poem 'The Magic Pizza'.


